A small gas kiln takes a piece at a time reaching temperatures of 900 centigrade. The red hot glowing pieces are then individually placed into sawdust causing spontaneous ignition and reduction of the glaze chemicals. Further Clock-minder Tales Quarter Chime Mystery

Those of you within earshot of the clock and take notice of these things may have been wondering why the quarter chimes have been behaving oddly. . . There has been a bit of a random nature about what rings when, or even no chimes at all.

I was equally mystified. I wondered whether there was some physical reason for it - you only have to lean over the clock and nudge one of the levers to advance the mechanism. This didn't seem very likely.

Having talked to Paul, who services the mechanism, maybe the air brake was faulty and the chime was jumping past one of the stopping points. All the old Victorian mechanisms seemed fine so it must be the rewind motor.

Winding motor with a part time fault . . .

The clock winds itself after each chime using a sturdy electric motor of the same sort as used to raise and lower the driver seat in a lorry. Sometimes the carbon brushes stick and cause a failure to run.

'How about a tap with a hammer,' I was told!

So I did.

Magic but we may need to replace the culprit in due course.

We shall see . . .

Lily said "I feel a bit different in my red jumper. I feel more responsible for the younger ones. I feel like I'm standing out more. I'm looking forward to getting ready for Haygrove."

We have also seen some new additions to the school building this Summer. By moving the office into the foyer we have now been able to bring the staffroom downstairs to a central position within the building. This has created the space for Mrs Barnes to have her own office upstairs. The work has only just been completed so we are still dealing with boxes and files but it is looking good so far and will make a real difference to work space and the feel of the school. We have also reinstated the original doorway out of the school so that the children can securely access the playground without walking through the car park. The First Severn Tsunami?

The Somerset Levels are the result of many years of salt marsh reclamation through the construction of sea banks. This started in the Roman Period. The Levels are however vulnerable to flooding from river sources, and from the sea at times when the sea banks are overtopped or breached.

In 1607 an area from Barnstaple in north Devon, up the Bristol Channel and Severn Estuary to Gloucester, and along the South Wales coast around to Cardigan was impacted by a huge wave. According to one of the contemporary sources, the coastal population was devastated with at least 2,000 fatalities.



The wave appeared as,

"mighty hilles of water tombling over one another in such sort as if the greatest mountains in the world had overwhelmed the lowe villages or marshy grounds. Sometimes it dazzled many of the spectators that they imagined it had bin some fogge or mist coming with great swiftness towards them and with such a smoke as if mountains were all on fire, and to the view of some it seemed as if myriads of thousands of arrows had been shot forth all at one time."

On the flat coastal areas along the Somerset coast, the tsunami penetrated a considerable distance inland. Haslett and Bryant have calculated that along the Somerset coast, the maximum inland penetration possible

of an 18 ft tsunami wave travelling at an estimated 35 mph was just under 2.5 miles. The floodwaters reached further inland in some places, such as to the foot of Glastonbury Tor (14 miles inland) because the land surface actually slopes landward in the Somerset Levels, so once the wave collapsed, the water flowed inland under gravity rather than back to the sea.

Field work by Haslett and Bryant in 2004 found erosion of rock at the coast including two large chunks of farmland on the Severn Estuary north of Bristol that were simply washed away; one of which is now the reservoir for the Oldbury Nuclear Power Station.

The cause of the tsunami has not been established, but the possibilities include a landslide off the continental shelf between Ireland and Cornwall, or an earthquake along an active fault system in the sea south of Ireland. (It may have been a combination, in that an earthquake might have triggered a submarine slide.) As the fault system in the sea south of Ireland has experienced an earthquake greater than magnitude 4 on the Richter scale within the last 20 years, so the chance of a bigger earthquake-caused tsunami is a possibility.

So my question is, in the light of what happened when a tsunami hit the Fukushima Daiichi nuclear power station in Japan in 2011, what precautions is EDF taking to protect the Hinkley Point C plant from catastrophic inundation from the sea?

I was talking to a Bank Manager the other day and she was telling me about the alarming number of instances where her customers have been the victims of fraud. There are so many fraudsters about that it's worth taking a moment to STOP AND THINK when you get a phone call, or an email or even someone knocking on the door who you don't know.

We've all had calls like this -

- "Hello, this is British Bank, there's a problem with your account, in fact, we think someone is stealing money from it. Can I just confirm your identity? Please tell me your PIN...."
- "Hello, this is the Tax Man, you're due a tax refund, which we can pay directly into your account, the money will be in tomorrow, if you'd just give us your bank details...."

Please take a moment to STOP AND THINK even if someone says they're from a trusted organisation like the Police or the Bank, how do you know? Ask yourself what's really going on. Because, deep down, you already know the rules for beating fraudsters, so stay calm, take a deep breath, and remember if something feels wrong then it is wrong, and it's time to put the phone down.

There are five basic rules for dealing with the fraudsters

- Never tell anyone your security details like PINs and passwords
- Always assume a phone call or email is a scam
- Never be rushed into making a decision

- Always listen to your instincts
- Always stay in control

In Case of Emergency! Break Glass!

A little story from a client of mine....she had got into the habit of leaving the key turned in the lock when she went to bed. Unfortunately, one night she felt unwell and pressed her alarm, summoning a neighbour who has a key. He could not get his key in the keyhole as it was blocked from the other side, so he panicked a bit, imagining her flat out on the floor and broke the glass so he could get in. She meanwhile was feeling better but was scared half to death by the sound of breaking glass. It's a miracle she didn't hit him over the head with a poker. The moral of this little story is Please take the key out of the keyhole when you lock the door, so that in an emergency, no-one has to Break the Glass!

Key Points from Parish Council Meeting held on Tuesday 12 September 2017

The Pound

Work is ongoing to make The Pound safe and to carry out repairs to prevent further deterioration. When the weather is suitable, action will be taken to replace the temporary mortar and re-render the walls where necessary. The Parochial Church Council has also been contacted and asked to make repairs to the wall of the Church room which is in disrepair, and to the window ledge which is unsafe. Once the repairs have been completed The Pound will be available for use by any resident that wishes to use it. Residents are welcome to attend the Public Forum which precedes the Parish Council meetings, held on the second Tuesday of any month, to ask any questions, comments or queries. Stogursey Parish Lengths-man

The Lengthsman has cleared the Himalayan balsam from the holding pond on Castle Street. They will be asked to continue working throughout October to carry out kerb scraping with the intention to carry out spraying in the spring.

S106 funding – Recreational facilities in or around Burgage Road

Progress on the proposed works in the Burgage Road Play Area (BRPA) is slow. Funding has now been approved, however issues on the Licence for Works still needs to be checked. It was hoped that the work would be completed by now.

Parked cars causing an obstruction

It has been brought to the Parish Council's attention, that a number of cars have been parked dangerously on pavements causing an obstruction and a risk to public safety, especially for pushchairs that are unable to pass safely without moving into the road, potentially in the path of traffic. Residents are to be aware that these incidents will be reported to the police and are asked to be considerate to other residents.
