

Sometimes titles can help us identify what something is about at a glance, but they can also create barriers and be rather off-putting.

Take the two quotes above. Over the years we have worked with the title 'Arts' festival but have aimed at promoting 'creativity' and 'having fun'. However, if we look at Aristotle's take on this, although we can appreciate his quote has a deeper message, it may not sound like much 'fun' to some of us?

At the Arts Trust we have come to recognise that the word 'Arts' can be off-putting and seen as only relevant to the artists within our community. We hope this year, teaming up with other groups who represent creativity in different ways will help yet more people, as well as the budding artists, to engage with having fun. You don't have to make or perform anything, but being in the audience or seeing what people have created is just as important. For most events in the Festival, it's an affordable outing on your doorstep and it won't cost you a fortune or anything if you are just passing through. So do note the dates and come and see what people have been doing in and around our parish.

The Festival opens on the evening of **Friday 10th of September** with the Burnham & Highbridge Band in the Victory Hall (see details from Phil Griggs in this edition of Stogursey News [SN]).

Saturday 11th September will be devoted to the Flower Show presentations, which we are hoping will remain on display throughout the week as additional exhibits in the 'Out Side Gallery', complementing the annual 'Lighting Up of Stogursey'.

Thursday 16th September - the Soap Factory Cinema will be able to open again and run a special evening for us (we are currently waiting for confirmation of this).

Friday 17th September - there are plans to rerun the successful Open Mic Night (first started in 2019), in the Church Rooms as a conclusion to this year's Festival events.

As more suggestions are confirmed we will add these to the programme for full publication in the September edition of SN. In the meantime, dig out your Christmas Lights and start thinking how you will decorate your front room windows so they *'look a picture'*! There is no theme just have some fun, you can make a display of objects which tell a story or just look beautiful, you can display paintings, drawings, sculpture and craft, arrange flowers and vegetables, build a scarecrow, but importantly have fun. Your windows could also be linked to the Flower Show exhibits (see details from Fiona Johnson also in this issue).

We are currently looking for other works for exhibition in the more public accessible spaces, such as Stogursey Motors' front window, the Church and Church Rooms, so do get in touch.

On other news the new East Quay Gallery in Watchet is due to open its doors this month with the official opening in the first week of September. One of the first exhibitions, The Essence of Watchet, has contributions from local artists who live and work in Stogursey. One of these exhibits illustrates the curious story of the disappearance of Rose Pike and Jack Henderson in 1923. You can read the story in this month's edition of SN.

A local mystery story -

The suspicious disappearance of Rose Pike and Jack Henderson, Watchet.

Case Reference WA 35:6

In the late summer of 1923 Rose Pike vanished without a trace from her home in Mill Street Watchet. Rose allegedly came from a family of some means.

Acquaintances described her as always being well dressed and calmly spoken. Later in court, Sergeant Chelmsford, who had been appointed as the investigating officer, was unable to substantiate this claim despite the fact that some items presented by the magistrate, in his words 'clearly indicated that she had good taste, which did not come from someone of a poorer background'.

At first it was thought that Rose and her assumed fiancé, Jack Henderson, a local fellow, had left the town to seek out a better life together in the northeast. They had left with some considerable debts including rent arrears and unsettled bills involving a number of stores and local suppliers, who accused the couple of running away from facing their obligations. Their landlady said she was 'glad to see the back of 'em. They was livin' a good life but failing to pay for it!' Many of those allegedly taken in by the couple were embarrassed and did not come forward initially, fearing that they would look foolish for being so trusting and that this may damage their business standing in the community.

Some days after Rose and Jack had been seen leaving Williton station on the Taunton train, the remains of a small vessel had been found washed up 40 yards east of the beach at Blue Anchor Bay, just below the alabaster undercliff. At first the findings had been associated with the Atlantic storms, which had recently ravaged the coast around Bridgwater Bay and further west to Watchet Harbour and onto the beach at Dunster. Amongst the scattered pieces of debris, however, were some items of interest. Once identified, these items presented caused the authorities to suspect foul play.

The Harbour Master had recognised the remains of the small fishing skiff as that belonging to Henderson. The boat in question had been procured by Jack as a part of a settlement over a gambling wager. On several occasions, weeks before their sudden disappearance, Jack had been heard suggesting that he and Rose take the boat out for a pleasure trip, but she had duly declined. Rose had confided in her landlady that she did not know how to swim and feared drowning in the treacherous offshore currents.

Mr Tom Burrows, a resident of Market Street, was returning from business in Barnstaple, around the same time as the authorities were considering an investigation into both the contents of the wreck and the unknown whereabouts of the couple. On hearing the news and having had some bad dealings with Jack in the past, Burrows came forward and alleged that he had seen Henderson in Barnstaple just days before, in the bar of the Bell Hotel on the Strand where he was staying. Known for his gambling and cheating at cards, Jack on this occasion was playing dominos. In providing a witness statement, Burrows said 'Jack was under the influence, bragging to the other players about duping his wife and stealing from her inheritance, to enable his a life as a true gentleman'.

Sergeant Chelmsford contacted the constables in Barnstaple and arranged to arrest Jack who as it emerged, had long gone. Mrs Dezia Davy was the publican of the Bell at the time, and copies of the register entries were made listing Mr Burrows, but there was no reference to a Mr Jack Henderson.

Even though his fingerprints were on record from a previous misdemeanour, there were no photographic or illustrated pictures of Jack, so the truth and his whereabouts remained a mystery. An early photograph of Rose, a haunting reminder of her frail and trusting character, was posted to every constabulary across England, but Rose was never found. Rumour has it that she was drugged with opiates, taken out to sea and drowned after the boat capsized in rough weather. Jack survived, fled the scene and although he left behind some incriminating evidence, it was surmised that he successfully changed his identity and made a new life elsewhere, undetected.

The case was revisited briefly in 1956, when new evidence was uncovered after some routine rock fall clearance at Blue Anchor Bay. Case ref WA 35:6 is now closed, but it remains unsolved, a curious mystery, with possible tragic overtones.

If you would like to see physical evidence relating to this historic 'cold case', it is on display from August, in a bottle/jar from the former South West Forensic Science Laboratory, at the new East Quay Gallery in Watchet. The jar is part of the 'Essence of Watchet' one of the first exhibitions in the new gallery, which has been curated by the artist Neville Gabie.

All the exhibits presented, echo the seafaring tradition of constructing miniature tableaux/stories inside a bottle.

The Eco Club started as a lunch-time club in September 2020.

The pupils got off to a very busy start, and planted up the big planter at the entrance to the school.



In spring the display of daffodils, tulips and wallflowers was wonderful, and very colourful.

The planter is now replanted with a mix of flowers and tomato plants.

During October, the team worked hard on the allotment boxes on the field, sowing cornflowers, candytuft, love-in-a-mist in the flower boxes, and broad beans in a vegetable box.

But in early November the Eco Club had to stop because of the second CV-19 lockdown. It wasn't until the end of April that the club could restart as an after-school club.

"It's really fun. It's fun growing plants especially runner beans." (Lilly)

Maddison said, *"I like it when we plant stuff and we pick stuff so we can take it home and show what we've been doing. We've planted some cucumbers."*



Ryan said, *"We've eaten tomatoes, radish, lettuce and marigold petals,"* as well as *"rocket, beetroot, cucumber and vinaigrette"*, said Saul.

Alexzander said, *"I like it that I get to go in the kitchen. In the kitchen we do washing, washing the lettuce and rocket. We used the spinner to get the water out."*

"And they gave us icecream as thanks." (Saul)




Just before the summer term ended, the sweet peas were ready for picking - and there were enough for everybody to have a posy.

Over 40 entries were received and thanks to donations from Marks and Spencer's, Taunton, all those who took part received a prize.


The winning entry was:



Points from the Parish Council meeting -13th July 2021

Some fly parking, close to the roadway, has caused concerns and an agreed solution will hopefully be in place shortly.

Immy's Update

A coat of paint might not be the first thing you think of when we talk about constructing a nuclear power station, but it's a vitally important step.

The second liner ring will eventually sit within the first nuclear reactor and form just one of the layers of protection provided by the reactor building. In the meantime, the ring is currently in a laydown area preparing to be painted. It sits in what is essentially a very big tent, which covers the ring and provides a temperature, humidity and weather controlled environment.

The structure which holds the tent up has eight levels of scaffold and stands at 20 metres high – a large enough space to fit the liner ring which itself is 17 metres tall and has a diameter of 47 metres.

The next step will be to begin the rigorous painting process where multiple coats of a permanent paint are sprayed onto the liner ring, leaving a finish of 140 microns (that's less than the thickness of a piece of paper), before a specialist product is sprayed on top to provide mechanical and UV protection. Big Carl will then lift the liner ring into place on the first reactor.

Hinkley Point C - Monthly Update



A round up of the latest news from Hinkley Point C.



The MEH team is celebrating a major milestone as they take their first steps to install electrical works in the first reactor's Electrical Building. The Electrical Building will house key equipment for incoming power from National Grid, before it is distributed to different areas of Hinkley Point C, including instrumentation and control systems.

MEH is the next major phase of the project and stands for Mechanical, Electrical and HVAC (Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning).

Our 15 Turbine Generator (TG) columns are a striking feature on site and are in place to support the Turbine Hall building. As construction progresses, the columns have been surrounded by another large structure which will hold the weight of 2,500m³ of concrete until it sets, and is specifically designed to make sure it does so evenly.



Once the concrete is poured, it will create the table upon which the turbine and turbine generator will sit.

Throughout the pandemic our priority has been on keeping our workforce and local community safe. 
