We'd like to say a big THANK YOU to all our helpers and supporters for your kindness and generosity.



## We're saving our planet!



We have been learning all about climate change and how we can save the planet. We are learning about global warming and what that is doing to Planet Earth.

### **Triscombe class** (Ages 4-6)

Charlotte, Bella and Harley like living on Planet Earth, though Harley would quite like to try out Mars as well. They like the food that is grown on Earth, particularly the fruits that become fruit juice. They have been making their own rainforest and the Arctic. They have thought about the animals who live there and made polar bears.

**Alfoxton Class** (Ages 6—8) Octavia says "We have been learning about climate change and how to help animals survive. We have been thinking about animals in our village, like hedgehogs who are in danger." Isla says, "We can help them, by making sure that they have food and make sure their habitats survive and they have homes." "We need to stop building homes on the land where they live." "If there are loads of people on the planet, where are they all going to live?" asks Ollie.

Climate change isn't helping the planet. It's getting hotter and that is why there are bush fires in Australia - it's very hot, and there hasn't been any rain. "We could visit Australia and give them hoses," says Casey C.

### Beacon class (Ages 8-11)

We have been learning about the world's countries and continents, the oceans, and how climate patterns change over time. We've been thinking about different types of animals and how they are classified. We're learning about how the environment can change and how that can pose a danger to living things. We want to know what animals and living things are affected by climate change and why. We want to know how they are adapting to their environment and how their environments are changing and what effect that has.

We're interested in extreme weather around the world, where it's happening and why. How are the different continents being affected by climate change? We want to know whether there are any patterns emerging and what changes can we see over a period of time.



A carbon footprint measures the amount of carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases produced by an object or activity.

### How do you feel about climate change?

Angry, anxious, mad, disappointed, upset, disgusted, confused, annoyed, sad, worried, petrified, scared, infuriated, terrified, unconfident, heart-broken, disappointed in humanity

### What are you scared will happen?

Flooding, forest fires, so hot nothing can survive, hurricanes, plant life dying, black hole, dogs dying in cars, sunburn, tsunamis, earthquakes, volcanoes, tornadoes

### So, what can you do?

Drive electric and hybrid cars, find alternatives to plastic, litter picking, stop deforestation, plant trees, campaign. Remember to recycle, reuse and reduce. We can conserve water. We can save electricity by turning things off.

### Points from the Parish Council Meeting – 15 January 2020

### **Stogursey Neighbourhood Plan Meeting**

A meeting has been arranged for Thursday 6 February 2020 from 7 – 8pm at Stogursey School. Parishioners are invited to attend to share ideas and discuss whether a Neighbourhood Plan is the way forward for the whole parish, including the hamlets. Residents will be asked

- what is important about living in the parish of Stogursey,
- what you like about the parish or the particular hamlet or village where you live
- what you consider is important to preserve in the parish
- what you would like to see in the future.

### VE DAY 75th Anniversary – Friday 8 May 2020

It is proposed to hold an event in the parish to commemorate the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Victory in Europe (VE) Day on Friday 8 May 2020. This will be another opportunity for our communities to pay 'tribute' to those at home and abroad who gave so much to ensure we all enjoy the freedom we have today. It is proposed to hold a 'Street Party' type event on the afternoon of Friday 8 May 2020 on the Gravel. If you are interested in assisting or have any other ideas for the event please contact the Parish Clerk.

### AED (Defibrillator) Awareness training

It is anticipated that a second defibrillator will be installed in the Babbling Brook in the coming weeks. A third is due to be installed in St Peter Church Stolford. Free awareness training will be conducted by the South Western Ambulance Service NHS Trust on Thursday 16 April 2020 in the Youth Club at 7pm. The evening will consist of a talk and demonstration; thereafter there will be the opportunity for residents to have a go. All members of the pubic are invited and encouraged to attend – you never know when you may be called upon to use it.

### **Dog Fouling**

The issue of dog fouling on public roads continues to be of concern. It appears that the additional signs displayed around the parish have had no effect. The Parish Council are looking at installing additional dog bins. Meanwhile attention is drawn to the information on the Somerset West and Taunton Council website.

Dog owners or walkers must, by law, immediately remove their dog's poo from land where people have the right to walk or enjoy. If you can't find a dog waste bin, you must take the bag home and dispose of the waste appropriately. We know most dog owners are responsible. But some dog owners or walkers do not clean up after their dogs. Dog fouling is one of the problems many people complain about across the country. Dog mess looks horrible, smells and can spread disease. In extreme cases it can cause blindness.

People who don't pick up after their dogs can face a fixed penalty of £50, or prosecution, which can result in a fine up to £1,000. For details see <u>Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996</u>.

If residents can provide proof that someone is not picking up after their dog, or wish to report a heavily fouled area or spot a full or damaged dog bin, then tell the District Council by using the 'something else' section of the "general enquiry" online form.

There is no excuse for allowing your dog to foul.

### ROAD CLOSED – TEMPORARY TRAFFIC REGULATION ORDER

A Temporary Traffic Regulation Order (TTRO) is a legal prohibition for through traffic passing and re-passing along the section of the road to which it refers. An issue will arise regarding residential and commercial premises, along with farmers' fields, where drivers do have a legal right to pass the 'Road Closed' sign in order to access their property. This limits the 'hardness' of the closure arrangements that can be applied.

'Hard' closure arrangements (such as water-filled barriers) can cause difficulties and complaints from those requiring legitimate access. There are occasions when legitimate traffic (emergency vehicles, highway maintenance vehicles) will need to pass and repass the road.

It is worth pointing out that due to the fact that a TTRO is in place, traffic passing through a 'Road Closed' sign is acting illegally and the vehicle/drivers' insurance is invalidated.

### **Somerset Climate Change Survey**

In 2019, all five Somerset Councils declared or recognised 'climate emergencies'. They are now working together to produce a joint Climate Emergency Strategy. The strategy will identify ways for Somerset to work towards being carbon neutral by 2030 and adapt to predicted climate change impacts.

This survey is being run on behalf of Somerset Councils in collaboration with Somerset Climate Action Network by independent market research company, Hope-Stone Research. All answers are confidential, and personal details will not be shared with the councils, their employees or any other third parties.

### Riparian Owners responsibilities

Parishioners who are riparian owners are reminded of their responsibilities. If you are a riparian owner, your responsibilities include the maintenance of the bank and bed of your section of watercourse, in order to avoid any obstruction of flow in the watercourse. Under common law you are the riparian owner of any watercourse within or adjacent to the boundaries of your property. Where a watercourse is sited between two or more property boundaries each owner may be equally responsible. ### **Stogursey Arts Trust**

### "My garden is my most beautiful masterpiece" Claude Monet

The painter Claude Monet created his most beautiful masterpiece in the village of Giverny, a few miles North West of Paris. He lived there for over forty years until his death in 1926. The garden evolved over many years of planting and landscaping, including the creation of the famous lily ponds, inspired by Japanese water garden design. The lily ponds and the colourful flowerbeds feature in some of his most memorable and famous paintings.

Monet did not like constrained or over organised planting, but he did arrange plants creatively considering their colours, their structure and how they would look together as they were 'allowed to grow freely'. It was as if he was sketching with the plants instead of coloured crayons, using the plants to compose the subject of his paintings in real life, before committing to depicting his garden creations in oils on canvas.

Proceeds from the sale of his work were ploughed back into sourcing and purchasing all kinds of rare and interesting plants for his garden, and like many of us who like gardening and are fortunate to have a space to plant and grow things, he swapped plants and seeds with his friends.

The garden and house remained in the family after his death, but suffered bomb damage during World War II and was sadly neglected until it was passed onto the Academie des Beaux-Arts in 1966. Gerald van der Kemp was appointed as curator for Giverny and finally, in

1977, the garden underwent restoration. It took ten years of research and reconstruction, but, as much of the garden had been recorded in Monet's paintings, and there were written testimonies and drawings, the garden is probably as close to the original created by Monet after he settled there in 1883.

Experiencing creative spaces can be very inspiring, as it clearly was for Monet all those years ago, but you don't have to go all the way to Paris to see wonderful gardens with fascinating histories. This year the Arts Festival team is creating the opportunity for people living locally, as well as our external visitors, to experience some of the amazing gardens in and around the parish.

We are proposing a mid to late August Festival this year, and we are currently looking for Artists/Gardeners to get involved in presenting their gardens for others to come and enjoy. Unlike Giverny, which has over half a million visitors each year, we are hoping our Garden Festival plan will enable you to enjoy the gardens on your doorstep and experience the atmospheres that our local Artists/Gardeners have created, without the queues and turnstiles, allowing you to wander through and be inspired by the beautiful spaces that they have created.

If you would like to be involved and would like more details, we will be holding an open meeting in March to discuss all the possibilities and share other ideas as they emerge. Look out for details or contact the Arts Trust team.

### **Immy's Update**

On Thursday 9th January we presented the latest plans for the refurbishment of Combwich Wharf to Otterhampton Parish Council and local residents. An application for the following works is currently being reviewed by Sedgemoor District Council, from which we expect a decision at the end of January.

2020 will see us enter the main phase of works on the wharf, with construction activity at its peak. Over the coming months, demolition of the Abnormal Loads Quay is planned to take place to reduce its height.

Following this, piling activity is due to begin in late Spring to construct the foundations which the Transfer Slab will sit on. The piling works will be completed using reduced sound methods, therefore limiting the impact of construction on local residents.

Once the piling activities are complete, works would start on construction of the Transfer Slab. This is the area onto which deliveries will be offloaded from the vessel. It forms a large part of the Abnormal Loads Quay.

We're anticipating that the bulk of works will be completed by the end of this year, before deliveries commence in 2021. You can still expect to see activity at the wharf into next year though, as the construction team carry out the final pieces of work, such as landscaping.
