Reflections from the Rector

Back in September 2018 Dr Winifred Kingsbury, longstanding GP and partner at the Williton surgery passed away. Her husband, Gordon Anderson, whom she had married in their twilight years, both of them being widowed, had died a couple of years previously. As their home in West Quantoxhead was being prepared for clearance, I was asked if I would like to look through and select from their theological bookshelves and Gordon's extensive CD collection. I didn't want to appear greedy with the CDs, so I made a modest selection. Amongst them were some Beethoven symphonies that I was not familiar with. As I write I am listening to one, Symphony No 7, and I am reminded why, generally, symphonies are not to my taste. For me there is too much noise: too much going on. Now there are probably some of you throwing up your hands in horror at my philistine comment. But the fact is, as the saying goes, 'it takes all sorts!' and 'all sorts' have different opinions on, and reactions to, things.

At this moment in our country, and indeed around the world, we are all responding differently to the situation in which we find ourselves. Some will be able to find little peace in the midst of anxiety; others may appear to embrace this time of lockdown and enjoy the space it gives. Many of us will be a mixture of both, and going back to my symphony analogy, whilst I may not be enjoying Beethoven's 7th, his 6th is one of my most played pieces on car journeys.

Many of us in one way or another will be affected by the death through this disease of someone known to us, or loved by us. Unusually, the Queen broadcast a message to the nation this Easter where she spoke of the hope of the light of Christ that shines in the darkness. She remarked how a single candle lit in the darkness and shared around the gathered congregation in church spreads a light that conquers the darkness of the night. Whatever our faith, or none, we can be lights to those around us. And more so than ever in this crisis people are supporting and looking out for one another in practical and emotional ways, whilst maintaining the necessary social distance.

In Stogursey, a good team has come together to provide a network of support at this strange and difficult time. The absolute and fundamental purpose is that no one in the village lacks the support and care they need. Food is given to the Quantock Food Bank in Watchet, food comes back to Stogursey from the Food Bank. Prescriptions are delivered, and groceries from the shops brought to the door of those who cannot go out. There is always someone to speak to at the end of the phone. In these and many other ways we are working together as a village to be lights to each other in the darkness and anxiety of this time. My thanks are to all those who have worked hard together as a team to make this happen. Sometimes we don't know our strengths until 'our backs are against the wall' as the saying has it. People in Stogursey have rallied together well to serve us all not just at this time of need, but to show our potential to be a village stronger together into the future.

My prayers and thoughts to you all at this time.

Tributes to Two Well-Loved Stogursey Characters

In the past month Stogursey has lost two longstanding, well-known and well-loved public figures, Dulcie Touchin and Peter Farmery. In normal times St Andrew's Church would have been full to capacity as the village came together to celebrate their lives, to give thanks for all that they have given to us, and to share with their families in mourning their deaths. Unfortunately that has not been possible. Dulcie's funeral was the last to take place in church on Friday 20th March, just before the lockdown was implemented, and her funeral was attended by close family only. Peter's took place in Stogursey cemetery on Tuesday 14th April on a beautiful day with the birds singing, again in the presence of immediate family only. Although not able to be present at the services, villagers from Stogursey lined the streets on both occasions to pay their respects to these two well-loved village characters, and we thank Sarah and Sam of Grandfield's for enabling this tribute to be possible.

Memories of Dulcie Touchin

Dulcie's funeral was the first to suffer the social effects of the Coronavirus, and we were all reeling at the fact that what we had expected to be a massive service was reduced to a handful. But as I said to the family, as I posted the notifications of the restrictions on Stogursey Pulse, I could just hear Dulcie in my head saying, 'Well it's gotta be, an'it.' And Dulcie had it exactly right.

Dulcie June Touchin, née Withers, was born into a longstanding Stogursey family, in a house opposite the school, on 27th June 1936. She was one of three children, her sisters being Kathy and Sandra. Her parents moved to Shurton when she was young and she grew up with Iris (later Searle) as her best friend.

Dulcie was always a hardworker. As a youngster she did pea-picking and spud-picking, as she recounts in 'Stogursey Voices', the oral history book of the village. And later, amongst other jobs, she took on the early morning paper round, which she did until a couple of years ago when she had a stroke. She always brightened people's morning with her cheery smile and greeting. After leaving school she and Iris worked at Van Heusen's shirt factory in Bridgwater (which is where Iris met Allan Searle). Dulcie Withers found her soul-mate and life-partner in Tom Touchin, a Fiddington man, who worked at Honeybere Farm, whom she married in Stogursey church. After they married Tom and Dulcie moved to Peadon Farm Cottages, where Tom was a herdsman to Metford Jeanes, and that was where the family was raised, Francis, Terry and Melanie.

Dulcie did a lot of walking, and a lot of biking. She did a lot of walking with various children sitting on the bike. There are stories of grandchildren and bikes and fish 'n' chips; of tipples of lager and lime; of skittles and Dot's Girls. She was a good wife to Tom with always a meal on the table, high teas for the family, trifles, cakes and all the goodies even into the latter times. Throughout her life she enjoyed coach trips out, in the days when coach trips were memorable with cider and beer stashed in the boot of the bus. Speaking in 'Stogursey Voices' she recalled: 'We went on boozing trips, skittles; they used to have all the beer, cider, whatever in the boot of the bus. We'd go to Weston, all over the place, mums and dads and kids.

With her bright red lipstick on and dog biscuits in her pocket for any four-pawed person that she encountered, her bright character and her cheeky humour, Dulcie could always be seen around the village, doing jobs, helping people out, generously giving chocolate bars to all the local children. Someone said of her, 'I always used to meet Dulcie at 6.00am as I was going to work and she was delivering the newspapers. She was always so cheerful and it meant that I started the day with a smile.' That is a beautiful tribute to the lady who many have described as 'an absolute legend.'

Memories of Peter Farmery

Peter and Liz Farmery arrived at Grove House, Shurton, fifty-one years ago, when Peter was in his late twenties. Although a working man with a family, Peter immediately immersed himself in the life of Stogursey, and took the village to his heart, just as the village has taken Peter to its heart. He led a Cub Scout pack in the village, and he got involved in the school. Indeed Peter was an ongoing influence in Stogursey school through many times of change from the time when his own children, Tim, Virginia and Kate attended there, to his becoming a Governor, to his taking on the Chair of Governors for many years. In addition he was instrumental in setting up the Friends of Stogursey School. In the years since his retirement he has regularly been in school listening to children read, and encouraging them all in everything they do. Many, many children in the village over the years have been influenced by Peter's support and encouragement.

Peter has had a very full life, he was content with all that he had done and had no regrets. He was incredibly generous in all respects: he would do anything for anyone; he would talk to anyone; he saw good in everyone and liked nothing better than to help people achieve their best. He was fun to be with, his cheery voice and broad smile brightened a room and he always made everyone feel welcome, everyone feel special. He was infinitely patient and with wide-ranging knowledge. He had a great love of poetry, of church music and a passionate love of the outdoors, engaging in every kind of exciting hobby: sailing, climbing, walking. In retirement he took a mountain leader's course and qualified in First Aid so that he could lead walks from Kilve Court and also assess young people doing the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme. He loved storytelling and made the walks fun by telling tales of Quantock legends.

Peter was a Yorkshire man, born in Pickering on the edge of the North York moors. On leaving school he did an apprenticeship in Manchester, and attended college in Salford studying Electrical Engineering. He and Liz arrived in Stogursey by way of a scooter across the Peninnes, an old caravan in Ffestiniog, with two cats, a dog, a horse and a donkey; a cottage in the Welsh mountains with presumably still two cats, a dog, a horse, a donkey and in addition, at various stages of arrival, three children and piglets called Maimie and Semolina. Liz will fill you in on the exact details at another time.

Jack, his grandson, said of his Grandad that Peter made him believe anything was possible and always helped him make it happen. Whether it was 'belaying' him at the climbing wall or setting up his own golf course in the orchard, Grandad was Jack's 'greatest supporter'. I am sure that there are many children in Stogursey, past and present, who would echo that sentiment too.

We now have to rearrange a new date and venue for this. You will all be informed in due course.



Saying "Thank you"

Perhaps there is someone who you would like to thank for a kind act or for helping at this difficult time. If so, (using first names only) drop a line or an email to Stogursey News and we'll publish all your "thank yous" in the June issue.



During this difficult and worrying time one of the things that we have been fortunate with is the weather; it has allowed us to go out and enjoy our gardens. Many people have suddenly found that they have time to tackle the jobs that they have been planning for a while, whilst others are having a go for the first time. The gardening year rolls along whatever else happens in the world, and the only thing that affects it is the weather!

So I have put together some jobs that need doing in May:

- Keep earthing up potatoes as the leaves appear so that the tubers are kept under the soil. Apparently removing the flowers helps to increase your potato yield as the plant puts its energy into them rather than the flowers.
- Support pea plants with twiggy sticks on both sides they help the plants climb and also make it difficult for birds to reach the young plants. Mangetout peas only crop on one side of the plant so it's best to grow them in a single, straight row.
- Thin out direct sown seedlings. Thinning carrots is best done in the evening as disturbing the foliage releases a strong scent that attracts the carrot root fly.
- Protect crops with enviromesh or an old net curtain, or plant strongly-scented crops like onions and leeks near leafy crops to deter aphids. Also herbs such as basil, mint, sage, lavender and rosemary help to confuse pests whilst attracting pollinating and beneficial predatory insects.
- Bedding plants and hanging baskets should be safe to put out in late May when frosts shouldn't be a problem!
- Prune spring-flowering shrubs after flowering, but don't touch evergreens util Derby Day (1st June).

I hope that when the Flower Show returns, probably 2021 now, all the experience that you have gained sowing and growing this year will encourage you to enter some flowers and vegetables in the show.

Happy gardening, keep weeding and watering!

For those of you who do not have a computer, but can access the TV, there are some great programmes on BBC4 and if you have not spotted it already, catch up with Grayson's Art Club. Scheduled for Thursday evenings at 8pm on Channel4, Turner prize-winning sculptor Grayson Perry creates a work of art in his studio, has phone-ins from other artists and encourages viewers to make their own pieces. Viewers can submit their work for the chance to be exhibited when life as we now know it returns to something less surreal. There are many other creative projects that the community can get involved in whilst staying safe at home. School in lockdown

"During the last part of term, some children came in to work with Miss Bushill and a rota of other staff, being careful to keep 2 metres apart. The children did some work and even had a daily PE lesson by taking part in the Joe Wicks' lessons on YouTube. The children seemed to enjoy it and even the staff had a go at this exhausting but fun activity! They even did some junk modelling, coming up with ideas for a redesigned playground. Maybe FOSS will be interested in their ideas as they are looking to raise money to revamp our playground!

"The children coming in took part in some of their folder work that everyone else got but then went on to work outdoors on our beautiful school field.

"Ryan managed to plant some tomatoes in the greenhouse and even set up a new allotment box for him and Max to tend to in their years ahead in the school.



"Isaac and Amelia have been in school quite a bit and have continued to attend during the school holiday and have done some work on the allotment boxes as well. Mr Tucker even grafted to dig out weeds and turn the soil. He was very tired afterwards. We have started to work on restoring the allotment boxes that are unallocated. That's 2 down, another 25 to go! In these uncertain times, maybe we will get the boxes all ready for whenever the school reopens."



Here is an account of one day at school during lockdown:

"To begin the day we got our bodies moving by watching Joe Wicks' PE workout. Some of the exercises were tough but they got our heart rate up!



Then the children went onto the Chromebooks to

practise their timetables. Isaac was really enthusiastic to beat the timer and enjoyed it when he earned lots of coins. After some more maths games, we had a go at solving some puzzles that Mrs Wall printed out.

Amelia enjoyed the crosswords and was interested to learn new words that she hadn't heard of.

We then spent the afternoon on the field playing games and digging out some of the gardening boxes.

To finish the day, the children wanted to make a kite so we spent time designing and creating a kite. We then went onto the playground to see if our kites would fly." This is what the children think of this bizarre scenario of being the only children in school at the moment:

"I like playing with the bikes." "I have really enjoyed helping out and doing crafts." *Isaac*

"I have helped gardening, but it was tricky." "We like that it's just us." *Amelia* Thank you to the staff for coming in during their holidays to work, and for also being key workers during this difficult time.

First and foremost I hope you are well, keeping safe and managing to access the support and essential supplies you need in these difficult times. You may be aware CCS, as a county-wide provider, is very much part of the response for both communities and individuals. All CCS staff are able to work remotely, so that we do not put them at risk. We have set up telephone systems to enable staff to be able to receive calls promptly and action them in the best way possible. Points from the Parish Council – April 2020

Stogursey Community Support Network (SCSN)

A community support network has been set up by residents (led and administered by Revd Nicky Morgan, Sukey Elstob, Hilary Jones and Becky Endicott). The network now has a team of willing volunteers who are looking out for our friends and neighbours in our community. The Parish Council thanks the team and all the volunteers for their hard work and tenacity in getting the scheme off the ground and has supported, and will continue to support, the Network by providing administration assistance and funding. Full details of the help and assistance provided by SCSN can be found in this newsletter.

Stogursey Neighbourhood Plan

Unfortunately, following the coronavirus (Covid-19) lockdown, the planned meeting of the working group was cancelled. However, although it is not possible to obtain resident input during the lockdown, it is proposed that the working group will continue to work on the plan: planning and scoping its content; identifying what information may be needed to feed into the plan; looking for images and plans, and planning what engagement to have with the wider public when restrictions are lifted.

Highways Issues

Somerset County Council (SCC) is responsible for all highway matters, from potholes to street lights and even dead animals in the road. In addition, blocked drains, and overgrown hedges, can all be reported directly to SCC. You may have the opportunity to note the condition of the roads while you are out walking. VE DAY Street Party

It is unfortunate that we have had to cancel the Street Party to commemorate the 75th Anniversary of Victory in Europe (VE) Day. It is hoped that VJ day will be celebrated instead later in the year. (See separate article on next page.)

AED (Defibrillator) Awareness training

An additional defibrillator has been installed at St Peter's Church, Stolford, and another will be installed in the Babbling Brook, Shurton when the lockdown has been lifted.

A date for the Free AED awareness training carried out by the South Western Ambulance Service NHS Trust will be promulgated when known.

Parish Clerk Vacancy

After 6 years in the Parish (3½ of them as Parish Clerk) I will be leaving the parish and will therefore have to give up my role as Parish Clerk. A vacancy notice will be placed on the parish website, in the local press and in this edition of Stogursey News. I have enjoyed working with the Parish Council and for the parish, and I have made good friends during my time here.

Annual Assembly

The Annual Assembly was cancelled this year – also due to the coronavirus (Covid-19) lockdown. The Parish Council have been given authority to make decisions by emails and to hold meetings remotely – the 2019/2020 Parish Council accounts, the Chairman's report and Report of the Stogursey Charities was circulated by email to councillors. They will also be displayed on the parish website. The Parish Council also voted and approved the re-election of the Trustees for the William Paulett Charity.

Riparian Owners responsibilities

Parishioners who are riparian owners are reminded of their responsibilities. If you are a riparian owner, your responsibilities include the maintenance of the bank and bed of your section of watercourse, in order to avoid any obstruction of flow in the watercourse. Under common law you are the riparian owner of any watercourse within or adjacent to the boundaries of your property. Where a watercourse is sited between two or more property boundaries each owner may be equally responsible. 

Magnox is committed to playing its part to support the country in the response to the coronavirus pandemic. That's why we have been donating as much personal protective equipment (PPE) from Berkeley, Oldbury and Hinkley Point A sites as possible to those on the front line.

To date the three Magnox sites in the South West have donated more than 17,000 items, to support priorities established by the network of local resilience forums across the country. These items include disposable respirators, suits and gloves and comes from both Magnox and our contractors and suppliers.

Along with other businesses, we are keen to do all that we can to support doctors, nurses and care workers to respond safely.

All the PPE can be spared without impacting on nuclear safety or emergency preparedness. It would ordinarily be used to support the delivery of work and projects on the Magnox sites, however much of this work has been temporarily paused while the country focuses on responding to the pandemic.

Gwen Parry-Jones, Magnox Chief Executive Officer said: "A key part of our response to COVID-19 is to help other organisations deal with the pandemic wherever we can. Clearly the need for PPE across the UK is urgent and our sites have done a fantastic job to identify PPE in Magnox stores that could safely be shared to support front line response work.

"The Nuclear Decommissioning Authority has given us their full support in passing this stock to local resilience forums in the communities in which we operate, while retaining enough to deal with any emergency that might arise at our sites."

UPDATE from Hinkley Point B site

The safety of everybody who works at Hinkley Point B and who lives in the local community is of paramount importance to us. Back in January, we put our pandemic response plans into place as a precautionary measure, and the station's executive team, trade unions and local pandemic working group have worked tirelessly since to combat the COVID-19 threat .

Hinkley Point B plays a very important role in the country's critical national infrastructure, and we must always maintain the nuclear safety status of our plant and protect our emergency arrangements. We must also not lose sight that the Government's definition of a key worker includes staff working in the civil nuclear sector.

As well as following Government advice and guidance, we have implemented a large number of preventative countermeasures to protect our workforce. These include:

- Introducing remote working and split shift arrangements in a safe and controlled way, which has
 reduced the overall daily footfall on the site by over 50%.
- Determining the level of risk associated with our vulnerable and high-risk employees and bringing in appropriate measures to support them (in some cases by sending people home, and in others applying greater social distancing at the workplace).
- Increasing hygiene and cleaning arrangements in high footfall areas, including making it mandatory for every person on site to use the anti-bacterial hand gel before using the turnstiles at the site entrance. We have also installed additional hand wash facilities in the old reception area.
- The introduction of social distancing measures across the entire site, to reduce the chances of catching the virus and spreading it to our loved ones, our work colleagues and within our community.
- One of the common symptoms of COVID-19 is a fever, so to safeguard the health and wellbeing of everyone working at the site, we have installed thermographic cameras in the security reception building. These cameras are now operational, and help us to identify people with elevated temperatures at the site entrance.
- The purchase of COVD-19 immunity test kits which allow us to confirm whether critical workers who have returned to work following symptomatic self-isolation for suspected COVID-19 were infected, and whether or not they now have a level of immunity to the virus.

This list above is by no means exhaustive, and just gives you a flavour of some of the things we are doing to keep us safe. In addition, EDF has launched a new internal well-being programme called 'Alongside You' to support employees and their loved ones during these difficult times. These sudden changes to both work and personal lives can be overwhelming, and each individual will be managing this in different ways.

We hope this offers your readers some reassurance that we are doing everything we can, and more, to keep our workforce and local community safe, and we will provide a full update at the next Hinkley Point Site Stakeholder Group meeting.

Finally, our thoughts are very much with those who have been affected by COVID-19.

Hinkley Point C Coronavirus Update & Critical Works Areas

The safety of the community we work in is of paramount importance to us. We've introduced a series of social distancing measures to keep both our workforce and community safe, using Government guidelines to inform our decisions.

We are continuing to listen to feedback and concerns from local residents and work with parish councillors to address worries. We appreciate your patience and support during this time.

Our colleagues on Hinkley Point B are working hard to generate electricity to power our homes. Key activities at Hinkley Point C need to continue today to ensure the UK has adequate power resource to do just that in years to come.

Whilst workforce numbers on site have reduced significantly, the remaining workforce are focusing on 4 critical areas of work:

Nuclear Island Unit 1 (1) Nuclear Island Unit 2 (2) Conventional Island Unit 1 (3) Tunnelling (4)

Whilst we can't meet in person for our forum meetings, we will run them by telephone conference as we did for the Transport Forum. The Community Drop In at the Babbling Brook on the 17th April has been cancelled.

Details correct as of 15th April. As this is a fast moving situation, please visit our website for the latest updates.

On Site we have:

Significantly reduced the number of workers on site from over 4,000 to around 2,000. All workers who are able to work from home have been doing so.

Added 60 new buses to the fleet to reduce the number of workers on each bus – buses now only 30% full. Screens are also fitted on buses to protect the drivers.

Increased our cleaning regime across site, including regular antibacterial cleaning on buses and on touch points.

Introduced floor markers across site (including for queuing in canteens/ at bus stops) to mark 2m between each person. In the canteens, allowing only one person to sit per table of 4 chairs.

In the Community we have:

Stopped servicing individual bus stops and instead pick workers up from the Park & Ride's / Campuses where social distancing can be managed.

Opened the campuses free of charge for non home based workers, to increase the safety of the community.

Introduced temperature checks (using thermal cameras) on all workers at the Park & Ride's and site entrance.

Community Support

The Hinkley Point C Project is supporting the NHS and local initiatives during this time. For example, Somerset Larder have donated food to two local care homes and produced hundreds of meals for Fair Share South West. The project has offered 5,000 facemasks to the NHS and given 1,000 facemasks to Devon and Somerset Fire & Rescue.
