

Avian Influenza Prevention Zone (AIPZ)

As of 5pm on 3 November 2021 an Avian Influenza Prevention Zone was declared across Great Britain. All bird keepers in Great Britain (whether they have pet birds, commercial flocks or just a few birds in a backyard are required by law to take a range of bio-security precautions. 



If you've scored 4 out of 4 perhaps you could give a lift occasionally to someone who can't get to their medical appointments. We are desperate for more drivers for the Stogursey Community Network Medical Transport Scheme.

If you agree to register with us, you would need a DBS check (re criminal record). You would also need to agree to let us contact you to check out your availability **when we get a request**.

You only need to respond if you are able and willing to take someone, and our Coordinator would then give you more details. So you might choose to take someone every once in a while (eg once or twice a month) or more often - *it's entirely up to you*. You can record your mileage for the journey and reclaim 45 pence a mile.

The SCN is an official outpost of the Quantock Food Bank. We can collect and deliver food bags to families and individuals.

- We are always grateful for donations to our Foodbank collection box (outside The Rectory), but please note that no medicines, or food past its Best Before date can be accepted.
- In addition, the Quantock Foodbank does not currently need tinned soup, tomatoes or pasta, or any catering packs. Thank you.
- If you need food assistance, either contact:
 - the Village Agent (for a Foodbank referral),
 - Home Start (families)
 - or us* for something from the Stogursey Larder.
- Contact us* if you, or someone you know, could use a delivery of supermarket-standard food and / or some fresh produce, or if you would like to donate.
- SCN volunteers will collect your medical prescription and deliver it to you at home if you are unable to get to the Surgery or the Spar/PO to collect it.
- SCN Medical Transport volunteer drivers can take you to a medical appointment, including doctor, dentist, optician, physiotherapy etc, if you are unable to get there any other way. Please see the next page for separate SCN Volunteer Medical Transport information.

- All passengers are requested to make a discreet cash donation for the transport provided. This amount should be what passengers can afford and feel is appropriate for the journey. Those who can afford more will be helping others on more restricted incomes, for which we are all grateful.
- Donations will be collected by the drivers in small paper envelopes which will be provided. The donations will therefore be anonymous, if so desired.
- Passengers should ensure they have the donation ready when they are collected by the driver.
- Passengers are politely requested to respect the rules of medical transport only, and to try to ensure that adequate notice of appointments is given to the Transport Coordinator, in order to ensure that we are able to provide an efficient service to all.

Understanding the world

At Stogursey School the classes have all been learning about the world – about its history, geography, its plants and animals. On Monday afternoons, all the children are Stogursey adventurers where they do practical lessons inside and out.

In Beacon class the children are learning about the planet earth and its biomes which are large areas of the planet with different vegetation, soil, climate, and wildlife. The younger children are learning about minibeasts and the autumn.

In Triscombe class we have been studying medieval history – four hundred years from the Norman conquest until the Tudors came to the throne. We learned that during that time, women couldn't be the monarch – it was always the oldest son who became the next king. We do not think that was fair at all!

During the Norman conquest, William the Conqueror came from Normandy in France and defeated Harold, the Anglo-Saxon King, at the Battle of Hastings






Harold died from an arrow in his eye. After William conquered England, he gave all the best jobs to his friends, including to William De Courcy who was engaged to William's daughter. He gave him the manor of Stoke (little place). Gradually the village of Stoke de Courcy became known as Stogursey.

In History we learned about:

Sources of evidence, where the Normans came from, what is an invasion, who won the battle between King Harold and William, the Battle of Hastings, an arrow in the eye, the Domesday book, Motte and Bailey castles, the de Courcy family.

Every Monday afternoon Stogursey children become Stogursey Adventurers! They are learning practical life skills and all about the world around them. Parents have been coming in to volunteer with cookery and woodwork lessons too! Mr Tucker says, "These practical life skills are so important to our community, and I am glad it is now a regular feature in our curriculum. Having parents to assist is exactly what our school is about - community involvement!"

Miss Dunwood has designed the Stogursey Adventurers' curriculum based on the principles of the scouting movement, and there are elements of science and design and technology woven through. Reduce, reuse, recycle, that's what it's all about; so don't make us the final, people all around.


Close fridge doors, save some power; it might seem quite odd, but it will help us.

Points from the Parish Council Meeting 12th October 2021

Paddons Farm

The saga of Strongvox and the transfer of land to the Parish is no clearer or nearer. It looks doubtful if the transfer will happen before 2023 at least. The good news for residents is that the issue with the drainage on the estate has been acknowledged, and it will be rectified.

Housing Needs Survey

(see Parish Council notes for November)

Highways Issues

The Parish Council was dismayed to hear that the volunteers of the Community Speedwatch team are being abused by some drivers. The good news is that they are recording all the registration numbers of those who fail to recognise the importance of complying with the speed limits and are passing the information onto the local police.

Neighbourhood Plan

The working group has received a welcome boost as it has been awarded £5,868 in government funding to progress their work. Steve and Nigel, along with all the other volunteers and Councillors on the group, are resuming work to progress the plan to the next stage.

Five into One – The new Unitary Council for Somerset

Parish Councillors are coming to grips with the decision by the Government for the four District Councils from across Somerset and the County Council to come together into one new Unitary Council in 2023. There is a joint working group carrying the ground work, outlining the many changes and opportunities that will arise to processes and services. The group intends to update Councillors and Parish Clerks as well as residents as it progresses. The change will bring forward local parish and unitary council elections to May 2022.

Points from the Parish Council meeting 9th November 2021

Planning Issues

The news in late October and early November that the Parish is to have another 27 houses built off Lime Street and another 5 on High Street, brings the total planned developments in the Parish to 64 new houses. In 2020 we were given "assurances" by officers and executive members, including the leader of Somerset West and Taunton Council, that consideration would be given to no more than 13 houses in any one year!

A vote of No Confidence in Somerset West and Taunton Planning Committee was passed by the Parish Council. This follows on from the vote of No Confidence in the Planning Officers of SWTC last year.

The Council members reflected on the lack of interest the members of the planning committee took in the objections raised, not just by the Parish Council, but by many residents. The infrastructure of the Parish may not cope with such a massive increase in residents, seeking to access healthcare services, etc., let alone their cars! The building works alone will bring lorry after lorry into all four routes into or through Stogursey, hopefully not, but probably all at the same time, but they have to start work within three years.

Housing Needs Survey

The survey completed on 25th November with over a hundred submissions made. The winner of the £100 Sainsbury's gift voucher is to be pulled from the hat at the Parish Council meeting on Tuesday 14th December. Thank you to all those who took part, we should have a presentation on the results at the Parish Council meeting in January.

Highways Issues

The Parish Council has received approval from Somerset County Highways to install Speed Indicator Devices at several locations on the route around the Parish. We are hoping to receive grant funding for the equipment, which will hopefully be in use by the spring.

Neighbourhood Plan

The working group has been busy pulling together a questionnaire and has reached a stage where it hopes to have it available for completion by residents of the parish early in the New Year. This will help the group to gather the information and ideas it needs to progress the formation of the Neighbourhood Plan.

The new Unitary Council for Somerset

Since my last update, the Government has been busy consulting with the current District and County Councils on the number of councillors and the timing of the election to the new "Somerset Council", which will replace the four District Councils and the County Council from 1st April 2023. I will continue to try to keep you as informed as possible, as the changes become clear over this winter.

The next Parish Council meeting will be on Tuesday 14th December 2021 at 19:00

SOMERSET BUS PARTNERSHIP

The future is suddenly starting to look a lot brighter for bus services in Somerset.

Over the past decade, public transport has not been an economic and developmental priority for Somerset County Council. Residents of this large, mainly rural county have been encouraged to rely on cars to get them to work as well as to shops, hospitals and places of entertainment and bus travel has dwindled accordingly. Bus journeys in the County have fallen by 43% over the past decade, we now have the second lowest bus journeys per head in the country and our bus services have the lowest satisfaction score.

But the Government's Bus Back Better strategy has prompted a major rethink with £3 billion of funding for bus improvements to be shared out between transport authorities across England (outside of London). Somerset County Council has responded and developed a highly ambitious Bus Service Improvement Plan (BSIP) and is asking the Government to fund the Somerset BSIP with an eye watering £163 million grant. You can read the 184pp document that Somerset has submitted justifying this bid here https://www.somerset.gov.uk/roads-and-transport/transport-strategy (the BSIP document can be found under the National Bus Strategy Section).

Even if the full amount of the Somerset bid is not granted, it is a recognition by Somerset County Council that its bus services need major improvement. Transport is the biggest emitter of carbon emissions in Somerset accounting for 44.1% of Somerset's total emissions. Given COP26, we must now make sure Somerset pursues the initiatives outlined in the Somerset Bus

Service Improvement Plan that encourage a switch to public transport and away from single occupancy private cars. This will reduce our carbon footprint.

Somerset Bus Partnership was set up so that the voices of bus users from across Somerset are heard. We now have over 80 "bus representatives" from all parts of the county who ensure we understand and reflect the needs of towns and parishes across the county. We still need some more representatives. **Could you be your parish bus representative?** Check if your parish still needs a representative: https://

We are also looking for support with the Somerset Bus Partnership's core team. Have you had management experience of the bus industry or in a transport department within a Council? Please do get in touch if you have.

Somerset is now entering into an Enhanced Partnership with local bus service operators to implement the Somerset Bus Service Improvement Plan. Somerset Bus Partnership has been invited to attend the launch of the Bus Advisory Board in late November. This is Somerset's first step in establishing a partnership arrangement with local bus companies.

Somerset Bus Partnership will continue to work with bus users and will hold Somerset County Council to the ambitious and worthy goals now espoused in the Somerset Bus Improvement Plan.

They also send a van every three months to Dulverton (Exmoor House car park) where you get the full service and can buy helpful gadgets like talking wrist watches, speaking bedside and kitchen alarms, magnifying glasses, thick writing pens. Holly brought a large selection to our meeting, and we shopped! All profits goes to the Charity.

This was not how the October meeting was supposed to happen – it didn't. Marion is now on the mend, but needs a few more weeks to regain her good health. We owe a big THANK YOU to Musgrove Hospital and their fantastic cardiac team!!

Vicki's Update

With COP26 featuring heavily in the news the last few weeks along with a renewed emphasis on the UK's Net Zero targets, I wanted to talk a little bit about HPC's role in UK energy production.

What is COP26 and Net Zero?

For nearly three decades the United Nations has been bringing together almost every country on earth for global climate summits – called COPs – which stands for 'Conference of the Parties'. In that time climate change has gone from being a fringe issue to a global priority. Cutting greenhouse gas emissions to net zero is acknowledged as the only way for the world to avoid the most dangerous environmental and social effects of climate change. We reach net zero when the amount we add is no more than the amount taken away and as a country we aim to achieve this by 2050.



Nuclear power is part of the UK Government's future energy mix for good reasons. It produces a lot of reliable, low carbon electricity in a small space.

In a future system powered mostly by wind, having nuclear in the mix makes the system more secure, reliable and makes net zero targets easier to achieve. HPC's contribution to fighting climate change means that during its 60 years of operation it will have a large, positive impact on the environment. Like all technologies, the construction and operation of nuclear creates some carbon dioxide emissions. Over the stations life, the impact will be even smaller than for wind and solar. Importantly all three technologies have emissions which are a just a fraction of gas and coal. This is why HPC producing 3.2 gigawatts of low carbon energy (enough to power 6 million homes) has such an important role to play in achieving the UK's target.



Somerset Sight Support

The HPC Community Fund has recently been supporting the more vulnerable members of our community to access vital services. Somerset Sight was awarded a grant for £85,000 from the HPC Community Fund to deliver and expand their

befriending service. The Charity provides a unique and consistent point of support for many - especially through those difficult times at the height of the pandemic - supporting 2,500 people in Somerset and offering specialist information, advice, and practical and emotional support to anyone in the county experiencing sight loss. Last year, they were the only point of contact for many throughout the lockdowns and provided a crucial frontline service. 80% of the people they help are over 75 years old and a third of them live alone, with an additional 500 new people seeking their help each year.

Funding is now available from the HPC Community Fund Open Grants Programme for projects, schemes or initiatives that will mitigate residual and intangible impacts of the HPC development and associated projects, improve community quality of life and wellbeing in addition to maximising the potential benefits of the construction. First rotor delivery

The first low pressure (LP) rotor, which will form part of the World's largest turbine, was safely delivered into the docks at Avonmouth at the beginning of November.

The 13m x 5m rotor arrived from General Electric's Belfort facility in France, via Rotterdam into Avonmouth where it will be stored until installed at HPC. There are three LP rotors per turbine which are key components of the power production equipment in the Turbine Hall.

Once operational, the two turbines at HPC will produce low-carbon electricity for 6 million homes.
