'The golden cockerel crows in the morning, Welcome children. Welcome the day'

Lower junior school assemblies often leave their mark on us. We welcome the return of Stogursey's regilded weathervane, our golden cockerel gently meandering round the points of the compass, especially when a winter gale blows up the Bristol Channel.

The oddest vane I ever discovered was the golden bed bug who decorates the church tower of Kingsclere in Hampshire, and is supposed to celebrate an uncomfortable night King John spent in the village. Fortunately he must have had a better night when he slept in Stoquresy.

Cockerels are of course the most common weathervanes, although it is strange that poultry don't appear anywhere in the Old Testament. However, in New Testament times, it is likely that they had been introduced by the Romans and we are familiar with the story of Peter at Calvary.

The Christian symbolism of our bird is very rich. An early pope decreed that all churches should display an image of a cock in honour of Peter and also to remind his contemporaries that it was the only animal which could withstand the lethal stare of the Basilisk, one of the disguises of Satan. Our bird looks around, vigilant against attacks from all directions.

The cock heralds the day after a night of darkness. Our first English historian Bede writes 'the Cock is like the souls of the Just, waiting for the dawn after the World's darkness, bringing hope to everyone, easing the pain of the sick, cooling fevered brows and bringing back Faith when it has lapsed.' There are some wonderful legends from Medieval times about Chanticleer the Cock and his dear wife Pertelot sharing escapades together and always outwitting Reynard, their bitter, cunning enemy. You sometimes get glimpses of these stories in the iconography of ancient churches.

When our venerable Chanticleer was carried down by the steeplejacks, he looked cheerful enough, but very weathered, and sadly revealed some war wounds; two ancient bullet holes undoubtedly afflicted by a marksman who could only cope with a sitting target. Now he continues to serve the village, as he does his church, into another era. May he continue his vigil into less troubled times. Give him a nod as you pass by.

News from the Quantock Medical Centre

As some of you may have heard, Health and Wellbeing Support is being offered at Quantock Medical Centre.

The Health and Wellbeing Support is based on an open conversation about lifestyle and moving more to improve your overall health. It is a very flexible service and can include support on a variety of topics to suit your needs; it can be as little or as much as you like. There are both inperson and virtual appointments available, as well as advice on getting active outdoors, as part of a group or at home. There are more options than you may think!

I am Grace, the health and wellbeing coach for Quantock Medical Centre and I have worked with Hilary during my time at the surgery. Initially we spoke about her goals and concerns around physical activity, and the types of activity that Hilary could and could not do and we decided together that the Love to Pedal programme would be the best fit for her. This involved a 6-week trial of a set of static pedals which can be taken home and used at a convenient time and place.

Hilary started out using the pedals lightly and slowly, building up the strength and stamina in her legs. Hilary and I had a call to check in on her progress halfway through the trial to make sure she was getting on well and to discuss any further help she may need; as Hilary was getting on well we scheduled our next appointment for three weeks later.

Hilary has now lost over 4kg and has been walking with her grandchildren as well as continuing with her static cycling most days. This has not only improved her physical health but also her overall wellbeing.



Lambswool with Apple Brandy

This is taken from p30 of 'The Almanac - A seasonal Guide to 2021' by Lia Leendertz.

"This was a traditional medieval drink for Twelfth Night or Epiphany, and was also used to bless the apple trees in traditional wassailing ceremonies held around this date.

The name refers to the fluff of cooked apple that rises to the top of the mulled cider. Be sure to use Bramley apples, or you won't get the fluff.

Ingredients Serves 8 - 10

6 Bramley apples 1.5 litres cider 150g brown sugar Half a nutmeg, grated 2.5cm piece of ginger root, peeled and finely grated Apple brandy (optional)

Method

Preheat the oven to 190°C/Gas Mark 5. Core the apples and place them in a baking dish covered with foil. Bake for 30 - 45 minutes, or until very soft and collapsing. Remove them from the oven, and leave to cool a little.

Put the cider into a saucepan with te sugar, nutmeg and gineger, and heat gently to dissolve the sugar.

Scoop the apples out of their skins and mash with a fork, then add them to the pot. Cook gently for 10 - 15 minutes.

Give the mixture a quick blast with a hand-held blender, to further break up the apple. Serve hot in heatproof glasses or mugs, and top with a shot of apple brandy, if desired."

Stogursey Arts Trust

"Let us be grateful to the people who make us happy; they are the charming gardeners who make our souls blossom" Marcel Proust

After reading about our plan to have a Garden Festival in 2022 (last month's Stogursey News), someone said to me recently, "You know we gardeners see ourselves as artists as well. Gardeners are very creative." At the Arts Trust we totally agree that if you see yourself as an artist and work creatively in different, non-traditional media or have other thoughts on your approach to performance we want to hear from you.

Our initial idea for the Garden Festival was to bring artists together from different disciplines; for example those who work in 3D, sculpture, painters, performers and (key to the project) local gardeners, to create a piece of work, which would complement the space, layout and planting of each garden selected for the project.

As the concept developed in discussions during lockdown, we started to recognise that its value would be seen more through the enabling of conversations between these artists (however they define themselves) and the journeys that they, as participants sharing creativity, will take. All the work between the participants, both process and outcome, will therefore be recorded alongside the building of a sculpture, artefact or creation of an experience in the selected gardens around Stogursey.

The progress record will form part of the Arts Trust Visual Archive, which we intend to use in future exhibitions, display and possible publication. It will be a testament to our ability as a creative community to work through adversity and to bring something positive to life in Stogursey during the ongoing pandemic.

We were hopeful, back in mid-November, that if the situation with the pandemic continued to improve in the early part of the New Year, that we could proceed with

planning for the Festival we had intended to take place in 2020. For two years now we have found alternatives to keep the spirit of the Arts Festival alive, and we were hoping, like many of you, that we had turned a corner and could look forward to a more creative and productive outlook for 2022. As we begin a new year in Stogursey, we feel that in the light of recent predictions, we all need something to uplift and carry our spirits forward. So even though we may have to react and change plans for later in the year, the Festival team are going to keep pressing forward with planning the 'Garden Festival'. As an 'Outside' experience where visitors can observe regulations and social distancing, it should have the potential to go ahead safely, but we will watch how things transpire and follow the guidance.

In the coming months, members of the Festival Team will be walking around the village, looking out for gardens where the planting, access or the visibility from the street could provide the opportunity for those gardeners to take part. If you think your garden could meet these criteria we would like to hear from you before we knock on your door.

In the meantime, if you are curious and would like to see other examples of outside Art and Garden exhibits (for those of you who have a computer), look up the Art Fund site where you will find two sections about this. We are not intending to follow these examples, but they do provide an interesting read if you can access them.

As we have learnt from previous years of collaborating with other interested groups, we are also seeking ideas for additional events, performances and collaborations with other groups, who may wish to join in, coinciding and creating a broader 'Festival/Show' for the village. You may, however, just wish to put your event on the proposed community events calendar and or the arts events notice board, so do let us know anyway.

Purple Mash

Mr Tucker asked Governors to find out what purple mash is; doesn't sound very tasty does it? Red cabbage with mashed potato maybe?

Octavia in Alfoxton and Ameleah in Beacon enlightened me:

"It's basically like a computer program that teaches us coding. That helps with most of our subjects. People have to make codes to get the computer to do things." "If you type purple mash into your laptop and then search it'll come up with purplemash.co.uk. You click on it and you might see a character that you can move with a click. You can select characters and actions.

We are given questions by Mr Tucker who teaches us computing and you can get help to program the characters.

We're learning how to code and to debate. It points out your mistakes and helps you to solve problems.

We welcomed two new Teaching Assistants to the school in September.

works at the school to provide one-to-one support for a child, but is enjoying helping out in many different ways in the whole school environment.

"Every day is different".

What Izzy hadn't expected was how quickly she would get to know everybody!

Izzy has helped start up and runs new afterschool clubs - Football Club on Mondays, and Country Dancing Club on Thursdays.

From January, the Football Club will run on Tuesdays for pupils from Years 1 - 4. Izzy then stays on and helps out with the After School Happiness Club.

As an ex-pupil of Stogursey School, Izzy says that although some things have changed, what hasn't changed is that the school is still a close community.

also joined the school staff in September as an Apprentice TA which means she attends college one day a fortnight.

Laura supports Alfoxton

class. Every morning she goes through the children's reading books, and then does one-to-one reading with some of the children.

When it comes to Maths, Laura has really enjoyed learning about the current approach to maths, including the language of maths: "So different from when I was at primary school . . . and [it's] lovely seeing the positive effects of a different way of teaching."

Housing Needs Survey

Parish Precept for 2022-2023

The Parish Council resolved their budget for the new financial year, and this will mean a very slight increase to the precept of seventy pence per year on a Band D rate payer's bill. The budget will help to pay for the maintenance of the Closed Churchyard and Parish Grounds, providing a safe play area at Burgage Road as well as improving and enhancing the parish. Of course, it also pays for the services of the Proper Officer and Responsible Finance Officer.

Neighbourhood Plan

The working group have been busy pulling together a questionnaire and have reached a stage where it can now go out for completion by residents of the Parish. Traffic concerns High Street, Stogursey

The Parish Council received a 40 signature petition seeking the Parish Council's support for a pedestrian crossing to be installed on the High Street. Another resident asked the meeting to support a 20 m.p.h. speed limit on the High Street. The Parish Council are sending both proposals to Somerset County Council Highways seeking to understand what evidence or submissions will be required to progress such proposals as well as understanding the criteria that would be applied by them to enact such changes.

The new Unitary Council for Somerset

The timing of the elections to the new "Somerset Council", which will replace the four district and the current county council from 1st April 2023 has been decided by the Government.

Elections will be held on **Thursday 5th May 2022** for their 110 members (two per ward). If you would like more information on the new Somerset Council they have a website :

STOGURSEY PARISH NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

Neighbourhood Plans (NP) give local communities a say in shaping the planning decisions that affect their district. When a NP is agreed it gives a community direct power to develop a shared vision for their neighbourhood and shape how it will change, develop and grow. This includes: what areas are important and need protection (i.e. heritage, ecology, landscape), the type of development (i.e. local green spaces, transport, access, community facilities, homes, shops and employment), what that should look like and what is needed to support the community and development.

The Parish Council intends to make a Neighbourhood Plan and a number of us started work on it last year, forming a 'steering group' set up by the PC. Most of the people involved in the steering group discussions are not parish councillors but we are working with the PC as it is ultimately responsible for the Neighbourhood Plan. We held meetings, mostly online because of lockdowns, to discuss some of the issues above. The official – or 'designated' – area for the NP is the whole of the Stogursey Parish.

Part of the NP process is to gather evidence of local opinions about the above issues and so the steering group has produced a questionnaire to survey residents' needs and their opinions about the future of the parish. This survey is to help find out what the priorities for local residents and businesses are, to understand what you value about the area and how the parish can support and influence change. The questions in the survey are intended to establish our local priorities for the Parish Council. Your answers will act as a guide for the next stage of the NP process which is to write the plan itself. This will help the Parish Council prioritise projects and matters that mean the most to you.

During January and February, you will be able to access the questionnaire online.

Please complete it to help us gather the evidence we need to make the NP match the aspirations of the residents of Stogursey Parish.

Combwich Wharf will take delivery of the Abnormal Indivisible Loads (AIL's) which are the pieces of equipment needed for Hinkley Point C that are too wide, heavy or tall to be split into pieces and transported separately.

Coolant pump passes flow tests

HPC's first reactor coolant pump has successfully passed demanding tests following its manufacture. The 128-tonne pump, which is 10 metres high was manufactured by Framatome at their Jeumont facility in France. It is one of four pumps per unit and responsible for circulating water around the reactor's 'primary circuit'. The first 'full flow test' was the culmination of years of work, with the complex test taking over four weeks to complete. This work paves the way for the manufacture and testing of the remainder of pumps destined for HPC. It is anticipated that the first pumps will be shipped to site next year.

When installed and running the pumps will be able to fill an Olympic sized swimming pool in just 80 seconds!

Investing in the future A new Electrical Centre of Excellence will accept the first group of trainees in 2022 on a programme designed to boost their electrical skills and give them a better chance of a job at Hinkley Point C. Once operational, the facility at the Somerset Energy Innovation Centre in Bridgwater will cater for hundreds of people as they gain new skills, as well as a sound working knowledge of the nuclear industry. This forms part of Hinkley Point C's £19 million investment to support education, training and skills. The funding has helped in the construction of other new facilities that will deliver mechanical, electrical and welding training. Together, they are creating career and training opportunities for local people, regardless of their previous experience or skill level.

HPC Community Fund Small Grants programme Did you know that Hinkley Point C supports local businesses and projects with its funding scheme managed by Somerset Community Foundation? The HPC Community Fund Small Grants programme has funding available, and applications for grants can be made at any time. Charities, voluntary groups and social enterprises that normally operate on less than £100,000 a year can apply for grants of up to £5,000, though grants of up to £10,000 (over a period of three years) may also be offered in exceptional circumstances. The funding is available to projects or initiatives that help mitigate impacts felt in the community as a result of Hinkley Point C's construction. Generally, decisions are made every six to eight weeks. The deadline for the next round of funding decisions is 9 February 2022.
