Ropes, Wooden Ladders and a Golden Fowl

Hard hats, nylon ropes, metal ladders, training, H&S, Risk Assessments and courage are all the components of modern steeplejack work, such as that undertaken by the Hewish firm Dawson, whilst currently re-gilding our Stogursey Church Weather Cock. The Dawson family business was established 1837 in Yorkshire and now resides in Hewish. North Somerset.

So, imagine 250 years ago in 1770 when steeplejacks, using hemp ropes, wooden ladders and home-constructed Bosun's chairs, took down the weathercock for repair and re-gilding.

Joseph, one of the Thristle family of clockmakers in Stogursey, was charged with the job of repairing the cockerel. Members of the Thristle family were resident and working in Stogursey and West Somerset from 1765 until 1899. Stogursey Church Wardens' hand-written records give us a glimpse of the work undertaken and the amount paid by the church. Due to restrictive copyright costs by Somerset Heritage Trust we are not able to reproduce the photographs, which we hold, of the original entries, so they are transcribed here.

Morrise Cole was the father of the famous James 'Conjurer' Cole of Nether Stowey and father of the two world renowned London clockmakers Thomas Cole and James Fergusson Cole.

The gold leaf for gilding the weather cock and clock dial were supplied by Thomas Pyke Brass and Iron Founder of Bridgwater!

Over the years the Thristle family manufactured longcase clocks and retailed them along with pocket watches.

They carried out work on all types of clocks, weather cocks, etc. in Stogursey, its hamlets and villages as far afield as Mark, Dunster, Wiveliscombe and Williton. Those living in Stogursey lived in dwellings mainly in Stogursey High Street. Many Thristle clocks are still in our village and hamlets and as far afield as New Zealand, Canada and the USA. They continue to tick, strike and keep good time. They survive just like the Cockerel!

"Every summer like the roses, childhood returns" Marty Rubin

The Royal Academy (RA) summer exhibition has been a calendar feature for gallery visitors since 1769. It has been described as the world's 'most joyful exhibition' and seeks to bring together works of art, submitted and chosen for display in the Academy's auspicious Burlington gallery in Piccadilly, London. Last year over 1300 works were chosen for display in the exhibition.

It is not a small gallery space, but every year the displays are so packed with work one can often be looking almost at the ceiling to see the submissions. Those of you, who may have visited the gallery, will recognise the challenge the curators face in hanging an exhibition with such a great volume of artwork and crowds of visitors. It is often difficult to see and properly appreciate the work, especially those pieces that have been hung high up or others somewhat swamped by the fact there is so much else to see. If you were visiting you may wish to return to the gallery over several days and avoid busy times when the crowds obscure a good view of the work.

The summer exhibition this year takes on the topical theme of 'Climate' and is open from the 21st June to the 21st of August, but this is not the main focus for this month's Arts Trust news.

In looking through 'what's on' to visit (if you dare run the gauntlet of Covid), further down the listings for the RA is an exciting opportunity for children and young people. The images of an alternative Royal Academy Summer Exhibition just for Young Artists is a bit of a treat. The work is interesting and fresh, not too crowded and there is a feeling of hope for the future (something we are all craving at this moment in time). Picasso once said he spent a lifetime learning to paint like a child, by which he meant with no preconceptions and no formal baggage, which can often get in the way of the joy of expression.

Entry for work is open to children and young people between 4 and 19 and unlike its 'grown up' version, it is free to enter and there is no theme. It can be anything from painting, sculpture, photography, installation, video, drawing or combinations of media.

If you are under 12 you have to get a parent, guardian or teacher to enter for you, and if you are over 13 you can submit yourself. Each young artist just submits one artwork and you have all of February and up until the 30th of March to send in your entry. Teachers need to register their school and there are prizes of art materials and practical workshops for the school if your work is selected; there are also prizes for collaborations.

The exhibition will be available to view on line from the 19th of July and selected works will be on display in the gallery from the 19th of July to the 14th of August. So maybe the imagination of childhood will return this summer at the RA. More information is available at https://youngartists.royalacademy.org.uk

If you are a young artist and you are thinking of entering, get your teacher, parent or guardian to send in your ideas and the story behind your progress for the readers of Stogursey News. The Arts Trust would also like to exhibit your work at the Arts Festival, but let your teacher know and they can get in touch with us directly at the Arts Trust.

Summer now seems a long way off, but to be ready for the Garden Festival, we have much to do by way of preparation. Spring will be a good time to select the gardens, which will feature in this 'outside' exhibition and once we have paired the artists, both gardeners and the makers, we will publish this for readers of Stogursey News. Our list is growing, but not complete, so let us know if you want to join in.

We have also had a request to create a yarn bomb to follow the garden trail. As yet we do not have a coordinator for this, so if you would like to take this on, do contact Tim Kaye and set up a meeting with interested individuals to formulate a plan.

If you are developing ideas for Festival events, performances and/or collaborations with other groups, please get in contact, we maybe able to help or share our knowledge of setting things up, raising money and finding volunteers. For more information about the Arts Trust call us on 01278 734550.



Points from the Parish Council Meeting 11th January 2022

Housing Needs Survey

The interim results were reported to the January Parish Council meeting. 19% response rate was on the low side, but there is sufficient information in the completed returns that a meaningful report can be considered by the Parish Council next month. This will be followed up by work going into the issues that have been identified affecting at least 15-20 respondents with housing needs.

Neighbourhood Plan

The questionnaire is now live on the internet for residents to complete, posters give a QR code for easy access to the online survey, but there are paper copies available if you would rather complete the survey with pen and paper. The closing date is the last week of February and a good response rate will help the group progress the plan further and help future planning for the parish.

Re-opening Safely and Re-connecting Communities.

If there are any community Groups who would like to be considered for a grant from the Funds held by the Parish Council, please make contact with the Clerk so that he can help you apply. We want all of our Community Groups to have the benefit of this external funding to help mitigate the costs involved in bringing the Community back together again safely in these wretched times. It is hoped that further support will be received and that this will assist events over the coming summer.

Planters

The Parish Council were successful last year in being awarded a grant to assist with growing for health and well-being and have decided that some of the money from that funding is going to be used to replace the planters on The Gravel. If required, those in other locations across the Parish will also be replaced to help conserve water and give opportunities for local greenfingered gardeners to show their floral prowess.

The next Parish Council meeting will be on Tuesday 8th February 2022 at 19:00 at the Victory Hall.

A belated happy New Year, and a big THANK YOU for our Christmas gifts; your kind thoughts are very much appreciated.

Just a few things to let you know about this month:

If you are feeling in need of a change of scene, a chance to meet and talk to others, why not join:

- our Tuesday morning walking group you can pick up a timetable from our reception.
- or if you are feeling creative, come along and join the Art Group on the 1st and 3rd Thursday of the month, 2 -4pm, at the Nether Stowey Church Centre (donation of £3 a session requested).

If you are in need of some help and motivation to get moving and improve your health, our Health and Well Being Coach, Grace, is available on a Wednesday afternoon to support you - just call reception to book an appointment. She is also able to offer access to groups for: Weightloss, Living with type 2 Diabetes, Well Women, and access many other activities.

First Contact Physiotherapist. We are going to be working with Cannington Surgery to share access to a physiotherapist once a week. They will be able to see patients with any new musculo-skeletal problems (unfortunately not those who currently have seen their GP and being investigated).

This is an attempt to help support the GPs' workload, and is successfully up and running in a number of Bridgwater practices. So please don't be surprised when you are asked by the receptionist for the reason you would like an appointment, as this is to try to help direct you to the most appropriate clinician.

Devon & Somerset Fire & Rescue Service (DSFRS) are committed to improving community safety to reduce the number of deaths and serious injuries in the home.

A Home Safety Technician can carry out a free Home Safety Visit, assess the degree of risk the person or family is facing, take the appropriate action to reduce the risks and help prevent a fire or incident. This can include the fitting of a smoke alarm or hard of hearing alarm (for those with hearing loss), supplying fire retardant throws and/or bedding amongst other specialist equipment, as well as advising the occupants on safe escape routes and what to do in the event of a fire.

Vicki's Update

Happy New Year to you all, I hope you all had a good start to the year.

The back end of last year saw the achievement of a key milestone at Hinkley Point C when the concrete was poured on the Turbine Table that will support the world's largest turbine generator, the Arabelle turbine. This is a vital step in readying reactor unit 1. Once the turbine hall is completed, the turbine will take steam from the reactor building and convert it into 1.6 gigawatts of electricity. When operational, both turbines at Hinkley Point C will produce enough low carbon electricity for 6 million homes.

The MEH Alliance also celebrated their latest achievement at Hinkley Point C in the official handover of the safeguard building for reactor unit 1 from the main civils team. The safeguard buildings house the vital components for the reactor safety

systems and play a vital role in nuclear safety, ensuring that nuclear fuel is always cooled and contained. They are designed to withstand external hazards such as flooding, and earthquakes so must be constructed to the highest quality.

The handing over of the safeguard building marks a key step in the transition of the civils phase of the project to the MEH stage- which stands for mechanical, electrical, and HVAC (heating, ventilation and air conditioning). The MEH phase of the project is where the mechanical and electrical components will be installed- including around 3,000km of power cables- which is roughly the distance from Hinkley Point C to Tenerife!



Those of you visiting the Southern Landscaping area in Shurton in the lead up to Christmas may have spotted the environmental efforts of volunteers from the Hinkley Point C Security, Site and Operations team. To offset their departments carbon emissions, the team planted 100 new hybrid elms, adding to the budding woodland area.

Secretary of State praises progress at Hinkley Point C

The Secretary of State for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy has been in Somerset, seeing how work is progressing at Hinkley Point C. Kwasi Kwarteng MP toured Europe's largest construction site with the Exchequer Secretary to the Treasury, Helen Whately MP.

The Government has committed to putting nuclear at the heart of the UK's future energy mix, along with wind and solar. Hinkley Point C will be crucial in helping the country hit net-zero carbon emissions by 2050 – by moving the UK away from high-polluting fossil fuels.

Business and Energy Secretary Kwasi Kwarteng said: "It has been remarkable to see how construction work is progressing and to meet with some of the workers driving forward one of Britain's biggest infrastructure projects. New nuclear is not only at the heart of our plans to ensure greater energy independence, but to create high-quality jobs, boost apprenticeships and drive economic growth.

The UK Government recognises that large-scale nuclear is the only technology available to provide continuous, low carbon electricity at scale. In order to strengthen Britain's energy security and reduce our exposure to volatile global gas prices, we are firmly committed to deploying new nuclear, as seen through the construction of Hinkley Point C."


