#### Changing Times for St Andrew's Church and the Quantock Coast Benefice

Within the next few months, those visiting the Parish Church in Stogursey will see a document pinned to the door outlining proposed changes to the parish groupings in Quantock Deanery. The PCC, and I, would be very grateful if you could take a moment to consider the proposals once they are published.

In the challenging financial environment it faces post-Covid, the Diocese of Bath and Wells has taken the difficult decision to reduce its number of paid clergy. Every area of Somerset will be affected by these reductions and in our area (Quantock Deanery), we are required to reduce our number of those clergy from 5 to 4.

We have considered very carefully how this could happen whilst ensuring that the church continues to serve our rural communities such as yours, maintain regular worship in our church buildings, and provide pastoral care for those in times of sorrow and joy. There were no easy answers but after a great deal of consideration by representatives from across the Deanery, and consultation with all the church councils, the following proposals are being made:

- Quantock Coast Benefice (the grouping of parishes of which Stogursey is currently part) will be disbanded and the parishes moved to new groups.
- Stogursey and Fiddington parishes will become a new benefice with Cannington, Stockland and Combwich.
- Revd Alison Waters (me) (based in Cannington) will be the new Rector of these parishes, including Stogursey.
- Kilve, Holford and Stringston parishes will form a new grouping with the parishes currently known as the Quantock Villages Benefice with Revd Eleanor King (Nether Stowey) as their new Rector.
- Revd Nicky Morgan will move to Bicknoller. She will remain the Rector of East and West Quantoxhead, and will also serve the parishes currently known as Quantock Towers.
- Watchet and Williton Benefice will remain as it is.

In addition, all the parishes of our Deanery will form a new Group Ministry. This is a means by which we can work much more closely together as clergy and church communities, supporting one another, and especially those invaluable and incredibly hardworking wardens and volunteers who keep our churches open and available to villagers and visitors.

The consultation period, once it begins, will last for six weeks during which all residents are welcome to respond to the proposals. If you would like to know more please do not hesitate to contact a Churchwarden or other member of the PCC (contact details to be found on the church noticeboard) and you are welcome also to contact me direct. If it is thought it would be helpful, the PCC will happily arrange an open meeting in the Village Hall to discuss these changes further. Just let them know if you would like this.

Getting to the point of this proposal has been difficult, and we are very aware that it will be painful for some. We are glad, though, to have been given the opportunity to put the plan together ourselves, knowing as we do the needs of our churches and our communities, and we believe that this proposal does offer the best potential for our churches going forward.

# Charles William Caple 1945 – 2022

Charlie did not have any family left alive and had named Rose, his kind and caring neighbour who lives opposite in Castle Street, as his 'next of kin'/emergency contact number. Over the years he built many friendships locally and Rose was determined that he be given a fitting tribute. She worked hard to keep as many of us as possible well informed as to arrangements and the events leading up to his final passing. Rose delivered this moving eulogy at his well-attended funeral at Sedgemoor Crematorium on Wednesday 25th January 2023.

Charles had links with Stogursey all his life and loved the village and its castle, where he was born on 21st June 1945, a fact he proudly told everyone.

With the help of my good friend Helen, we traced his family back to his grandparents William and Fanny. They had three children, Percy, Robert and Albert. Percy was born in 1907. He was Charlie's father. His mother Gertrude was born in Bridgwater in 1911. She was working as a grocery assistant in 1939. They married in 1941. Percy was a Police Support Officer in the village and in later life became the lollipop man at Stogursey School. He also planted the chestnut trees on the gravel, another fact Charlie was proud of. Charlie left the local school and went to work at the Poultry Packers¹ in Nether Stowey, Later he worked at Bordens, now Sharpak, in Bridgwater as a machine operator. As he got older he stayed past retirement as a cleaner.

He supported the local Youth Club by going into Bridgwater each week and buying the latest hits for them to listen to. He was an active, outdoor man whose hobbies included canoeing and hiking.

He had a Robin Reliant car and went on holiday to the continent. Charlie was a full-time carer for his parents as their health declined. His mother died in1992 aged 82 years, and his father in 1999, aged 92 years.

He had a long term relationship with his partner David lasting 46 years, though they were frequently parted due to work commitments. They bought a static caravan on a Naturist site in Devon and enjoyed many holidays there. David now resides at St Benedict's Care Home in Glastonbury and Charlie was his full-time carer until April 2022. Charlie also helped many elderly residents in the village so it was quite fitting that when ill health struck he was able to call on the community to help him.

I myself only had the good fortune to know him in the past couple of years and tried to help him as much as possible, introducing him to Stogursey Lunches, Forget-Me-Not Café and Friday Coffee Mornings. He often came across for coffee and to enjoy the sunshine in our garden. My husband's family knew him for much longer – over forty years.

Charlie was a very private man but had a great sense of humour, even remarking to Carole Mallet, on being asked if he was going to Lunches the following week: "Yes, you can be my Tuesday date!"

I still look across each day as I always did to see if his curtains are open. He always sent me a text if he wasn't feeling well saying he was resting so I wouldn't worry. He would have been touched that so many people turned out for him today. I sincerely hope that we have done the best for him at the end, and as no flowers were requested a donation box will be available to go to Stogursey Lunches in his memory, a place he enjoyed and looked forward to each week.

#### The Big Freeze of 1962/63

My answer to the question on the front of January's edition is Yes, I most certainly do remember the "Big Freeze". My birthday being in the first week of December, at the start of that event in 1962, I had just turned 9 years of age.

After Christmas on Boxing Day our parents took the family up to London to see a special festive edition of "Sunday Night at the Palladium" with a very young Bruce Forsyth as the compère. (Who remembers his centerpiece, 'Beat the Clock' forerunner to 'The Generation Game'?)

We lived in Crayford Kent, just 35 minutes on the train to Charing Cross in the City, and as we did not have a car, it was all by train, bus, or Shanks' Pony in those days. It was on the way home on the train that it first started to snow, and every station the train stopped at the snow seemed deeper, and deeper; it was relentless. After we arrived at Crayford station we had to walk half a mile across the town to our house near the top of the High Street and, as usual, took the narrow alley from the station that circumvented the greyhound track to the town centre. The snow was virgin all the way home and as it was by now nearing midnight, only us about; both my older brother, sister, and I had a fantastic time and made so many snowballs, and the snow was still coming down thick and fast.

The next morning my mother opened the kitchen to garden door to let the three cats, Mickey, Bootsy, and Cindy out (no cat flaps then so they stayed in all night after feeding) and she was faced with a frozen wall of snow right to the top where it had drifted. I can still remember her exclamation which brought us all to see the problem. My father was home and pushed the drifted snow out, but it was still very deep, so he went out to the Anderson Shelter which was now a shed, and with a shovel cut a path for the cats. They were so funny tiptoeing in the snow. Then he had to get the fire going; no central heating but coal fire chimneys to all the main rooms, including bedrooms. After breakfast we couldn't wait to wash, dress, and get out to play all day in the snow. For us children it was heaven and up to Shenstone Park we went with our homemade toboggans.

As the snow lasted for so long my father and older brother made a Bob Sleigh with a steering bogie controlled by two ropes, handles at the rear to push off and a front cowling made with chicken wire and paper mâché. It was remarkably strong, and they painted it in the same blue as our winter Olympic team. Also they painted Great Britain and our Union flag on the nose cowl.

Friday night will be spent with hosts (some people arrange to meet with others to share cooking and facilitate communication.) of vegetables, fruits, home-produce, handicrafts . . . and much more.


Fiona Johnson, who has been the Show Organiser for several years, is stepping down from the role. Thank you Fiona for all your hard work over the years.

#### **Stogursey Arts Photographic Society**

#### "I am an amateur and I intend to stay that way for the rest of my life." Andre Kertesz

I discovered the photographs of Andre Kertesz more than thirty years ago and although his work has its place in history, his approach remains very relevant to photography today.

Kertesz was internationally famous during his lifetime and unlike many personalities in the public eye today, he never sought celebrity status, he just felt the subject matter he explored was enough motivation for his work. There is pure modesty in how he approached making photographs. Later in life, when he was unable to venture outside his apartment in New York due to ill health, he remained the 'brilliant amateur', photographing the park below him and the simple beauty of objects on his windowsill.

The apartment photos are a great example of his approach. Kertesz draws the viewer to consider these ordinary objects on his windowsill, purely because, in the first instance, his documentation of them makes us curious to look further. These ordinary objects are simply given more than a glance, because he has presented them to us for consideration via the viewfinder of 'his camera'. We find ourselves looking for a deeper meaning, even if there is not one, but in looking to try and understand why and what he sees in them, we have engaged in some thing guite special. It makes us think!

The technology of auto exposure and digital adjustment of today's modern 'camera phone' means that taking photos as an 'amateur' is much easier. We don't have to worry about all the technical stuff, as the 'phone does it for us; all we have to do is concentrate on taking the 'picture', composing it with a mind to record what it was we saw.

It sounds easy, but it's not. Kertesz had a natural ability to select and compose his images, and although he had an intuitive skill to make his memorable photos, what made them great was the modest way in which he approached the task. The images are sensitive, they are not flashy, they are extremely honest. Today, we can still relate to these images, even though they are now dated; the subjects they portray are still fresh and retain their curiosity. See if you can find his book in the library: 'Kertesz on Reading' or if you have a computer, seek out his images on line.

After only a few meetings, we have established a regular group of SAPS, but I am sure there will be more of you out there, who may want to improve your skills or find out how you can improve as 'amateurs' through sharing your experiences and skills with the group.

If you missed Dave Hathaway's collection of local (photo) vintage postcards, we will be repeating this presentation at the next meeting of SAPS. You are welcome to come just for the talk, but you are also encouraged to stay and join in our discussions and get involved.

So if you are an interested 'amateur' or a 'modest professional', do come along and join in.

The next meeting is booked for **9**<sup>th</sup> **March**, **starting at 7pm** in the Jubilee Rooms, Castle Street. There is a voluntary sub (entry to the talk) of £2 to cover running costs of the Jubilee Rooms.



Helen has been working as a nurse for 43 years, and we have been very lucky to have her working with us for the last 7 Years.

The tea party will be at **St Marys Church Centre on Wednesday 8th March from 3pm – 5pm.** 

All are welcome, so please come along and join in. If you would like to make a donation towards a leaving gift you can drop this into the practice for safe keeping.

#### **AGE UK Walk & Talk**

We are aware of many residents in the village who have become increasingly isolated and lonely since Covid; many have lost their confidence, become weaker through not leaving their homes, and not joining in with the activities they used to.

Age UK Somerset offer a number of services including a Walk and Talk service for anyone over 60 years old. This free 'Walk and Talk' service aims to support older people who would like to get out and benefit from fresh air and being more active, but don't feel very confident about going out by themselves or would just appreciate some company.

After clients have registered, they will be matched with a suitable volunteer. Then over an initial 16-week period, clients will be called for by the volunteer each week, who will then go out with them for a short walk starting from (and returning to) the client's home.

The pace of the walks will be set by the client and will not be strenuous. Every client is different and so the duration of the walks will be tailored to their needs and wishes. The social aspect of having a friendly chat during the meeting is seen as just as important as the walk!

#### What are the benefits of the service?

- An increase in confidence
- An increase in fitness
- A reduction in feelings of loneliness or isolation
- An improvement in physical, mental and emotional wellbeing
- Meeting new people, making new connections
- Being introduced to new activities in the area

#### **FUND RAISING FOR EQUIPMENT**

On another note altogether: we would like to organise some fund-raising events this year to raise money for new equipment at the surgery. There are many new devices that would help save clinical time and free up additional appointments particularly for our nursing team. For example, one procedure we are required to do for patients with leg ulcers and compression hosiery is to take annual Doppler readings. This process can take over an hour with our current Doppler machine. However there is a new machine on the market which costs approx. £3500 and will only take 20 minutes instead of an hour, with improved readings, and a much better experience for the patient.

We also maintain the village Defib which costs the practice approximately £1000 a year including heating and lighting to maintain the battery life, its annual health check, defib pads for children and adults (£300 each time they are used) and a new battery (£350).

Could you support us by holding a fund raising event to help? Maybe you could put on a coffee morning, a tea party in your garden when the weather is better, a beetle drive, a quiz night, or support an auction of skills and promises. The Lance Storage and Transfer Compartment Pools

Here on site, we have now successfully completed the heaviest lift of the project to date.

The Lance Storage and Transfer Compartment Pools emerged slowly out of its pre-fabrication building to be set down by Big Carl in the Unit 1 Reactor Building.

Weighing in at around 780 tonnes, the lift marked the end of more than 12 months of intense assembly work by the EDF project team and our Contractors Darchem.

The assembly work included the installation of large, prefabricated stainless steel panels, falsework and rebar for the surrounding walls, a transfer control hut, and 14-tonne sluice that controls water in the Reactor's pools during different stages of operation, such as refuelling.

The panels were lifted into position, then welded and checked using X-ray radiography techniques to make sure the weld quality was to the required standard.

Before the lift, two beams were installed at the bottom of the pools to give Big Carl the right leverage. The Lift team then dropped the pool onto a set of "mega-props" that will support the structure while its being "stitched" into position.

#### About the pools and bunkers

- Several pools will be installed in the reactor building. These pools are used during outages to make sure that radioactive components, and fuel moved in and out of the Reactor, always remain covered with water.
- The Lance Storage Pool is used for storing the Reactor's internal sensors and detectors, which are housed in long tubes called instrumentation lances.
- The pre-fabrication buildings, known as "bunkers," were constructed to provide a weatherproof environment that helps increase efficiency and ensure the exceptional quality a nuclear power station needs.
