
May Meeting

RECTORY RAMBLINGS

Last year I was writing at this time in anticipation of the celebration of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee, and the reopening of Stolford Church after a period of renovation. A year on, we have now celebrated not only the reign of the world's longest serving monarch, Queen Elizabeth II, but marked her death, and witnessed the coronation of her eldest son as king, Charles III, the longest heir in waiting, so we are told. Few, this time last year, would have anticipated that as we approach June 2023, the Quantock Coast Benefice, brought together under Philip Rahilly in 2007, combining the benefices of Quantoxhead and Fiddington with Stogursey and Stolford, would be being reconfigured once again.

The Diocese and the Church of England nationally are following a policy whereby the number of clergy in parish posts is being reduced, and parishes amalgamated into bigger groupings. The intention is that trained lay people (volunteers from the local parish churches) take on more of the ministry traditionally done by the vicar or rector. with oversight from the parish priest. To this end within our local group of churches known as Quantock Deanery. the parishes of Stogursey. Stolford and Fiddington will be administered by Revd Alison Waters, together with the group of parishes, Cannington, Combwich, Otterhampton, Stockland and Steart, for which she currently has responsibility; Stringston, Kilve and Holford will join Revd Eleanor King with her current grouping of Nether Stowey, Over Stowey, Spaxton, Enmore, Goathurst and Aisholt; and I will move to Bicknoller sometime in June with the parishes of East and West Quantoxhead to join the parishes of Bicknoller, Sampford Brett, Crowcombe, Stogumber, Nettlecombe and Monksilver. Watchet and Williton are also part of our Quantock Deanery, but due to their size and socioeconomic make-up, they are not impacted by the change. So right now I'm sitting in a Rectory which, for the last nine months at least, I have known that in all probability I will be leaving (not an incentive to housework at all!), surrounded by attempts to pack (easy things only) and eleven years' worth of papers to sort – not to mention the papers that were already in the Rectory when I moved in!

We are planning a celebration for the Quantock Coast Benefice in St Andrew's church on Sunday 28th May at 10.30am – Pentecost Sunday. This will be followed by a Bring-&-Share Lunch in the Jubilee Rooms, Stogursey to which all are invited. I have loved my time as Rector of Quantock Coast living in Stogursey, made many friends and had a great deal of love and support – in work matters yes, but not only work: with Maisie and William (dog walking, dog sitting, claw-cutting and cat – urgent visits to the vet) with chores around the Rectory (washing up) help with the garden (cutting the grass, cutting back brambles, weeding) meals delivered to my doorstep when I've been busy or ill, and the many times we have shared meals together.

Now is a time of change but not an end. I'm only eight miles down the A39, hardly any distance at all I can say, as someone who has driven that route down the A39 more time than I can count in the last eleven years. And as a group of clergy in the Quantock Deanery we are committed to working together in a new form of Group Ministry. Whilst I will now be Rector of the newly reconfigured Quantock Towers Benefice, my door is always open to you, my friends from Quantock Coast.

So now it's to packing and sorting, but with my thanks for all you have given to me over the eleven years I have been privileged to be your Rector.

The school began their celebrations ahead of the King's Coronation with parents (and cake!) in the Victory Hall. **THANK YOU** to Allan Searle for the use of the hall, and to our friends at the Parish Council for gifting a delightful commemorative coronation mug to each child. We are also grateful to our parents who provided cakes for the celebration which went down a treat, and to our wonderful FOSS team for presenting a packet of wildflower seeds to every child.

Stogursey Adventurers

Popping Peppers! Beacon class continued their Mexican theme by cooking Fajita's from scratch. Mrs Payne shared some top tips about preparing and cooking vegetables.

Cooking with meat. The children learned how important food hygiene is, and what practical steps they can take to be safe in the kitchen, for example: washing hands after handling raw meat and keeping raw meat and veg separate during preparation. The cooking that the children undertake at school helps them to explore different cultures, recipes, equipment and ingredients, AND allows food to be tried in an often new way.

THANK YOU to the staff and parent volunteers who work so hard to make this happen!

On Monday afternoon Alfoxton Class visited Stolford Beach to look at erosion and how the land has been protected using sea defences. The children looked at how the sea had eroded their structure over time.





Triscombe Class

Hector the Tortoise came to visit!
Did you know that tortoises do not have ears? And that they hear through vibrations? The children asked lots of interesting questions and learned that if you want to keep a tortoise in this country, they must

come with a birth certificate to prove he or she been looked after very well.

Children have also been using their book, 'The Storm Whale,' to imagine they are the main character Noi and then tell an animal story with help from some cuddly toy animals.

In Maths, Reception have been concentrating on numbers that are doubles. Year 1 and 2 have also been looking at length, height and measure.

The children have enjoyed their swimming lessons. They have tried really hard and made progress during their lesson. "One of the swim teachers asked me to believe in myself and I did then I could do it" shared Ivy. It is wonderful to watch their confidence grow!

As part of our Animals topic, the children have been bird watching this week. They went out onto the field, and were able to spot a good number of birds, including blackbirds, crows, sparrows and swallows.

After spending some time looking for and talking about the different types of birds, the children then made natural bird feeders using pine cones. Jasmine explained, "I used butter, pine cones, seed and tied it with string." It was lovely to take our topic learning outside.

Alfoxton Class

Children in Alfoxton became scientists and planned an experiment to see which materials did/did not conduct elecricity. "We've predicted what we think is going to happen and we will be using crocodile clips, batteries, and a buzzer..." Using the correct circuit symbols, they also drew them in their books. "It was really fun seeing my circuit work and everyone in our group was really proud," beamed Harry B.

In Geography we are discovering how rivers start. "I like learning about it because I've always wondered how the rivers are formed," explained Sofiah.

Charlotte is enjoying new class book, 'Rhythm of the Rain,' by Grahame Baker-Smith which celebrates water cycles and captures the movement of water from the tiniest raindrop to the deepest ocean, across the earth.

English has focused on Show Not Tell, which is trying to say how someone is feeling without using the word, but by describing their facial expressions. The 15 spellings we are focussing on have been sent home to parents. We will be breaking these words into pieces to help us remember how to spell them.

Year 4's continue to practice for the National Times table test.

We explored the idea of parables in RE, using 'The sower and the seeds.' The class wrote what they thought Jesus was trying to teach using this parable. We then looked at what other people thought and formed an opinion with more clarity.





Beacon Class

Wow! What a jam-packed time for Beacon Class! From super-fun science lessons to starting the Archbishop of York Award, to auditioning for roles in the Summer Play, the pupils are buzzing with excitement!



"Oh! we've been doing really fun stuff like our new history of art topic," explained

Lenny, "Where we learned about early art and did a cave man drawing ourselves."

One child in year 5 said their highlight this week was starting a new book, 'Street Child,' by Berlie Doherty, which is a tale of an orphan boy in Victorian London who is sent to the workhouse.

Finlay's highlight of the week was auditioning for the school play, **Pirates of the Curry Bean**, which promises to be a comical adventure!

He said, "Auditioning was very fun and exciting, and I'm very happy that I got the role I wanted". Some children chose to take various roles back stage like: helping with props and the computer display.

The pupils have begun their journey to complete the Archbishop of York award - how exciting! Pupils could be seen building their team-working skills to achieve a shared goal! "My group found it really hard until we worked together to find a way to make it work," said Ameleah.

The Year 6 pupils have demonstrated great resilience and shown how hard they can work during the KS2 SATs.



They worked tirelessly on all of their tests, so a HUGE well done to all of the children taking part. They have earned a well-deserved break, although it's a shame the bacon sandwich breakfasts have come to an end! "We've had to work really hard but it is definitely worth it because we got extra play and the teachers have been really supportive," explained Georgina.

This month's quote came from one of our readers. They don't attend the Society's meetings, but they do follow our write ups each month with interest. Many thanks for this 'food for thought'.

As the aspects and themes of our photographic project emerge and provide 'food for thought', we recently found ourselves focusing on two areas towards developing a new archive to complement the existing historic photos of our village. When these original photographs were taken, it appeared that the photographer(s) were focusing on showing the 'place', the houses, streets and historic buildings.

From the discussions that followed we found ourselves asking the question: what would we want to show or record that is relevant to us now? What could we convey to future generations regarding what we value now?

Last month the front cover of Stogursey News was illustrated with a humble sparrow frozen in flight. It was an image that seemed to be an indicator of the opening up of the natural year, with creatures finally venturing out after surviving the bleak winter months.

Around Stogursey the countryside is teaming with nature. In years to come will we be able to look back and celebrate this as an important aspect of where we live? With the reported consequences to natural habitats through climate change, will we still see the humble sparrow around and about or will it have become a rare and threatened species? Choosing themes for us to document has suddenly become more challenging for our group.

Our second area for consideration is based on the people and community. From the photographic records we have seen, it is difficult to piece together an accurate picture of what living and working in the village was like back in the day. For *our* photographic project, we are looking to create a contemporary narrative that says something about 'living and working' in the village today. We have started by looking at examples of late 20th century documentary photography, which has helped us in finding a starting point to tackle these challenges.

Starting with the individuals who make up our local community groups and businesses, we are going to attempt to create portraits in a working context that will tell their story. We will be in contact with identified groups in the near future to discuss and arrange photo shoots. If this has given you 'food for thought' and you would like to participate, we would love to hear from you.

Our next meeting is the 8th June, starting at 7pm. There is a voluntary sub of £2 to support the charity and its running costs.

Points from the Parish Council Meeting 9th May 2023

Presentations

HPC gave a detailed update on the marine works, which disturbed the sleep of many recently. There is no intention to repeat late evening works, unless absolutely necessary. Mitigation has been done to minimise the likelihood of any excessive noise. Works are only likely to be necessary on about 5-10 occasions and should be completed by mid July.

Steart Marshes WWT gave an update on their take over of the management of the Bridgwater Bay National Nature Reserve. It is hoped that several areas in the parish that fall within Bridgwater Bay will see improvement to ditches and hedges as a result.

Allotments

Representations from several of the allotment holders relating to the unkempt state of several plots were raised. Councillors are undertaking inspections as a result and it is hoped that the plots will be maintained to the standard expected and hopefully be fully utilised and productive.

Burgage Road Play Area

Nearby residents have been subject to anti social behaviour by some misusing the sheltered bench within the play area. The Parish Council has decided, as a result of the resulting damage, to have the covered bench removed due to its unsafe condition as soon as possible. It is disappointing that the actions of a few have such an impact on residents and other users of the play area.

Coronation Celebrations and Commemorative Mugs

The Trustees of the Victory Hall successful applied for a grant to help provide an afternoon function to mark the King's Coronation.

Pre-school and primary school-aged children of the parish should have received the commemorative mug that was purchased for all such children. Several more have gone to preschool-aged children of the parish, but if there is a child who has been missed and who would like to receive such a gift, then please let the Clerk know so that one can be delivered.

Parking

The Trustees of the Victory Hall have successfully applied for funding from the HPC Rural Parking Fund to enable vehicles to be parked in spaces at the Hall. Information on the scheme, which has the backing of the Parish Council, is on another page within this issue of Stogursey News. The trial will be assessed after six months. It may help relieve some of the issues which have been highlighted recently within Stogursey.



A huge step forward

A major concrete pour has been completed on Unit 1's Reactor Building. The 30-hour, 900m³ pour formed the tenth layer of the Reactor's Inner Containment Structure.

The Inner Containment is a 1.3m thick concrete structure that sits against the Liner Ring, this forms part of the Reactor's safety barrier. The concrete was poured in twelve separate layers.

Please make phone calls at the time of the disturbance. The more complaints that are received, the more likely it is that the police will respond.

Complainants' names are not given to the perpetrators.
