"I am forever chasing light. Light turns the ordinary into the magical." Trent Parke

This month, as we celebrated our first anniversary and as the autumn evenings closed in, the group were faced with a challenge.

Unpredictable weather, darkness and very little available light, were conditions that made us think we needed to change our strategy and look to the weekends, where we could take photographs during daylight hours. However, one of our members Colin Pye said, 'Why don't we go out and photograph the village at night?'

So with street lamps, the moon and the lights from uncurtained windows, we set out on a rainy evening to see if we could capture some scenes around the village.

For many years, in the recent history of photography, both professionals and 'snappers' have used electric flashlights on their cameras to compensate for low light conditions. The results can often create stark, unflattering, 'bright' and contrasty photos, which, in themselves have character, where the flash adds its own quality to enhance or create its own distinctive look.

Before this technological solution came along, additional lighting was provided in a more subtle way, that of 'painting with light'. This process involves using artificial light sources where you literally project light onto the subject, moving it to cover the object(s) of interest, so the camera can capture the light reflected back through the lens, from the surface and recorded onto the film.

Painting with light has been around since the late 1800s, where it was first used by the French scientists Demeny and Marley, who experimented with photography to record movement. The first known light painted photograph, records their assistant's 'Pathological Walk From in Front' and it was made in 1889.

More recently (1950's / 60's) some of you, who have worked at the power station, will remember the strange ghostly images of the turbine halls printed in promotional publications and professional journals. These eerie images are the result of large lamps 'painting' the dark spaces and turbines with artificial light and allowing the camera shutters to be open for a long period of time, sometimes up to 30 minutes, so the film has more time to be exposed to the reflected light.

As we walked around the village we used torches to 'add in' some light to shadowy spaces and painted some of the buildings in the manner of the turbine halls at Hinkley. These experiments were a bit 'hit or miss', but where we had 'hits', some of the images had taken on the visual qualities reminiscent of some of the old postcards we had been looking at a few months ago. Some pictures of the castle for example were so soft in focus, to appear almost like old oil paintings.

Hopefully our descriptions of our endeavours are arousing your curiosity and you are looking forward to visiting our exhibition next year. We will keep you posted. In the meantime if you are part of a local group, society or business, we would like to take your (group) portrait to be included in our 2020's village archive. We will be in touch.

During early December, we will be purchasing some Christmas trees for Stogursey's Christmas Tree Festival. The size of the trees will depend on what deals we can get at the time, but be assured they will be big enough not to be mistaken as hair ornaments!

Last month, we announced that we are intending to run the Christmas Tree Festival in the church, in the run up to Christmas day. We promised we would give you a bit more information this month so you can get involved. So to recap:

The Festival will simply involve individuals and/or groups 'adopting' or 'making' a tree to decorate, which will be on display in St Andrew's Church during the lead-up to Christmas.

We have already had more than ten responses from groups who have contacted us and said they would like to 'make' a tree. So our first task is to find out how many trees we need to purchase for those who want to 'decorate' a tree. We are asking for a £5 entry fee and we will be happy to receive additional donations towards the cost of the trees.

You can let us know about taking part by filling out a simple request form, which you can find and leave for us to pick up from the Post Office.

We will also need tree stands, so if you have any surplus to requirements, that you could lend us, please let us know by leaving your contact details on 01278 734550 and we will make arrangements with you for 'pick up'.

There is limited capacity to run tree lights on 'mains' electricity, so we would urge participants to use battery powered LED lights. We will however be testing the available day light in the church to assess the feasibility of running solar powered lights and will let you know our findings in due course and also at the drop-in session (see below).

We have contacted some groups directly, but if you have ideas that you are working on independently; as promised, we are running a drop-in session in the Church for advice and help on 8th November between 6.30pm and 7.30pm. If you can't make this date, do let us know and we will let you know when we will have a follow-up session.

Making a Christmas tree for this project and/or its decoration is an 'open brief', encouraging all involved to get creative and have some fun.

However, you don't have to have made or decorated a tree to help support the Festival; if you can do the odd hour or two to help steward the exhibits during opening times, again please let us know so we can organise the rota.

In preparation for celebrating Harvest Festival in St Andrew's Church, we have been working on a presentation all about harvest celebrations around the world. We partnered up and researched a different country in our pairs. We learned about how harvest is celebrated in our countries and wrote short speeches. We have practised our reading voices which needed to be loud, clear and not too fast. We hope everyone enjoyed hearing about the different countries as much as we enjoyed learning about them!



Also, we created some artwork for the Harvest Festival. We used our knowledge of painting techniques to create a printed backing of copper and black. Next, we drew

our own fruit and vegetable stencils and carefully cut them out. We all had fun stenciling the fruit and vegetables over the top of our copper and black backing. To finish it off, we cut letters from newspapers and magazines to label our stenciled foods – they look amazing! We are going to display them in school for all to see before we take them home.

Highlight of the week for Rupert was Science, where he learned all about friction and how it slows a moving object down. The children learned that if they rub their hands together eagerly, they can demonstrate how friction makes things hotter. The children explained how they took five different materials; carpet, rubber, rough plastic, sandpaper and smooth plastic to understand that the greater the friction, the shorter the distance the car travelled.

Harry B explained, "There was a big meter ruler and our smaller rulers to measure how far the car had gone – it was fun I enjoyed it."

Kayleigh added, "We wrote down in our books how far the car went."

Rupert summarised, "This showed us how different materials had different friction and that more friction meant the car travelled less."

Harry L admitted that he was, "Very tired and my head is exploding every day because I've been learning so much".





We are looking forward to the Harvest celebration, and have been working hard on our fruit and vegetable collage and poem.


Triscombe

Triscombe have been writing their own food poems based on the poem Spaghetti Spaghetti by Jack Prelutsky. We've enjoyed hearing the children sharing their lovely creative ideas for favourite foods.



In the outside classroom, the reception children have been busy using construction role play resources. They have been talking about how to use tools, how they work, and what they can be used for.

In Art, children have been painting fantasy homes based on the art of Colin Thompson. The children have used watercolour paints and fine brushes to paint detail. They have been working carefully and thoughtfully on their masterpieces.



The Triscombe pupils went into our orchard to pick apples and collect leaves. The children had a great time picking the best ones to do printing. The children enjoyed

painting the apples and leaves and arranging them to make pretty patterns.



Our reception children have already started to take books home to share with their families. They are thoroughly enjoying their books at school, and were incredibly proud to show their chosen books!

Parent reader Tash comes into school each week to listen to children read, "It is so rewarding, it so nice to see how the children progress week to week in their reading".

ADVENTURERS

Alfoxton students were able to apply their learned knowledge of how bridges are built to construct their own beam bridge from found objects. The resourcefulness of

children enabled them to see first-hand the advantages of using strong and rigid spans of steel or wood when weight was applied to test the strength of their completed bridges. They



also knew to ensure that the columns supporting the spans were both strong and positioned appropriately.

Triscombe Class have just finished their 4-week block of cooking. In their last lesson, they kneaded bread dough

into small pizza shapes. They then layered a choice of tomato sauce, mozzarella cheese, pepperoni, ham and tomatoes. They were able to see how the dough rose as it was cooked. The pizzas were a real favourite with the children.



HAPPINESS CLUBS

The children at our Happiness Clubs enjoyed trying different food. On Tuesday the children and staff had chicken in a mushroom sauce with rice and carrots. Some of the children and a member of staff were quite shocked when they were told they had eaten mushrooms and had enjoyed it! The children are always encouraged to try new things. On Wednesday, the children made their own pizzas for tea. Ivie-May, in Triscombe Class, was able to instruct the others how to make them. In **Breakfast Club**, the children have enjoyed a variety of

breakfasts; this has included toast, cereals and croissants with a variety of spreads.



FIREWORKS DISPLAY LAUNCHES 20

Hinkley Point C - Monthly Update A round up of the latest news from Hinkley Point C



Exciting Progress in the Tunnels

The Marine Team has achieved a major milestone in their tunnelling efforts having successfully excavated their way to the first vertical Liner, a crucial component connecting the heads sitting on the seabed with the tunnel below. This achievement was made possible using advanced technology, specifically a remote guidance system, ensuring precise excavation towards the access hatch of the Liner.

Following this achievement, the team has prepared the Liner for the next steps. They have drained the water, used to weigh down the Liner, and are now ready to conduct detailed surveys and geological studies.

Simultaneously, the team is hard at work connecting the Outfall Tunnel to the second vertical Liner, marking ongoing progress.





Celebrating six years of positive impact

The Hinkley Point C Community Fund has granted a remarkable £15 million to support local initiatives.

Managed by Somerset Community Foundation, the fund consists of two main programmes: the Small Grants programme offering up to £10,000 over one year or £20,000 over three years and the Open Grants Programme for larger projects.


